
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

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ArtWork Special Feature A Smart Search Box can produce positive results at minimal cost!

THE IMPORTANCE of accurately searching online content of an organisation's website could not be overemphasised as it could help enhance further interests in the business and eventually increase the overall revenue

For clarity, this is not about a global search engine optimisation for website traffic nor an intrusive product recommendation system, but mainly about having a search box on a business website to guarantee the display of relevant results to visitor's queries on the products or information held within the website.

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An ordinary search box on a website is usually a single-line text-area which is capable of accepting a visitor's inputs and searching for those inputs within encourage online visitors to use the company's database, the only difference being that a Smart Search Box does the job a lot more swiftly and accurately.

Currently, the search boxes on most sites do not have the capabilities of displaying relevant and accurate information.

Online visitors are often faced with the aw kward display of "Sorry, no results found!", "We can't find a match!", "No search results for..." or they are presented with just completely unrelated information.

There is usually relevant information within the organisation on the subject searched but the search routine could not deliver accurate and relevant results, so turning away a potentially valuable customer

The reasons for this anomaly could be many and various, but a good search algorithm, with minimal cost to website owners, could assist the search box to consistently display a list of relevant information making it a truly 'smart' search box.

A Smart Search Box

would consistently deliver accurate and relevant results using various techniques which could include machine learning, natural language processing and artificial intelligence, to mention a few. An efficient search box could drastically reduce a noshow results display!

For instance, most art galleries, museums and other art outlets could not detect a simple anomaly in user inputs which usually result in a "No results found!" scenario or just displaying erroneous lists of records. Many could improve the user experience of their online visitors if they could consider our efficient search solution for their websites for as low as £ 10 per month (with free trials).

Organisations should their own website search box as the best means of searching their own contents. Instead of using a global search engine – they could now use a reliable internal search box to retrieve a more desirable display of results.

Art galleries, museums and artists, in general, with the aim of selling artworks or relaying information online, could implement a smart search box on their websites to display relevant information to customers and assist their team in achieving the ultimate goal of completion of sales and increased revenue, at such a minimal cost.

Online visitors to media houses and news outlets making enquiries could also benefit from an efficient search box that would display relevant results. An efficient search solution could also deliver a highlyefficient digital information retrieval system, in general.

"When lockdown began I came up with mask making for the makers who were suffering financially and managed to get a donation to buy materials and a sewing machine to get started. We took orders daily and delivered and have also support we have received from Ocean Terminal donated hundreds of masks to charities and schools

"Lockdown was a challenge but we did not give in and we went out to deliver during the whole time to keep money coming in for makers and artists. We received amazing support from our local customers who sent us encouraging messages and bought so much from us to help us survive.

and illustration. It's out there pronto, edgy, no hiding, no second chances. Corporate meetings transformed Goodbye boring old minutes, clunky Powerpoint images. Much more interesting, accurate and human when Katie turns all that into something unique, understandable, amusing... and human. Dross to gold. Pure alchemy. No wonder Google snapped her up. No

All three emphasize the importance of taking time to live a little and be sure that you really really want to be a professional illustrator. It's demanding, risky, with no guarantee of regular work. Important too, not to undervalue yourself, and to be businesslike Above all, realise that being a bit wacky and original is much more than OK, it's exactly what publishers, PR and advertising agencies love. So, if you're thinking of getting career advice from H M Government's online app, illustration may not be for you!

And so to the Good Ship Illustration. The three started planning the course last year, not anticipating that it would be a life-saver for many stuck at home, from all over the world too.

People who have not been to art school. professional illustrators, picture-book makers. painters, some who have taken time out to have children and are looking for a way back into their creative practice, others looking to break old habits and develop new ways of working, or to kick start

Some five hundred people go on-line every Friday for the week's 'Art Club'. It's a lovely mix of care, professional advice, encouragement, humour, and fun – like "portraits, and drawing on your head. but, don't worry, no headstands!"

The three share the tuition, and it's the chemistry between them as much as the subject that makes these

The blurb for 'Find Your Creative Course', starting in November, hints at the style: "Bask in your weirdness and follow your creative dreams. Want to be part of an online community, full of fellow creatives? Build your illustration career and make your best creative work ever? It's time to discover how good it feels to truly be yourself in your work!"

Covid-19 lockdown: 'An unexpected boom' for some rural galleries

brought an unexpected surprise for some local galleries – a marked increase in sales.

Mary Ann Rogers, a wildlife artist who runs her own gallery in Northumberland admits to being 'struck dumb' when lockdown first hit in March. "All orders dried up, and I settled down to focusing on the positives, which included painting some really big pieces, safe in the knowledge that I had all the time in the world.

"I was persuaded to follow the lead of a gardener friend, and do a 'live' painting video on facebook, never imagining it would develop into an avid community of people who looked forward to their midday 'fix' of painting and chat. Tales about my river swims and nature notes, alongside 'broad brush' and loose watercolour painting were extremely popular, and the audience grew and

"An unexpected bonus was that sales of original paintings were lively, along with a range of art materials as people used their time to explore their creative sides, with the support of the videos and a new lockdown facebook group.

"People frequently stated that they were saving money which was usually spent on meals out, holidays etc. to treat themselves to pieces of art instead. What could have been a disaster was

actually a very positive time. Angela Thomson of Artisanand gallery in

Aberfeldy recalls, "I remember writing out to all the artists before re-opening at the end of lockdown worrying that we wouldn't have the footfall of tourists we normally see through the summer season, however post lockdown has seen sales well ahead of last year. Many of the customers buying have been those who used lockdown to re-decorate and were looking for the perfect piece to finish the



Hornel: From Camera to Canvas... ... and from Australia to Kirkudbright

An exhibition at the City Art Centre in Edinburgh charts the photographic origins of many of the painter's best known works. Mary Gladstone, our south west Scotland correspondent, does some digging in the Artist's Town.

MENTION Kirkcudbright, the 'artist's' town in visit was a success, they discovered that Japanese S.W Scotland, and the name E. A. Hornel springs to art techniques had already become westernised mind as he was possibly the artist most responsible and their opportunity for exploring the country for putting this community on the map, particularly was limited. By the late 1890s, Hornel realised he ring the late 19th century.

Edward Atkinson Hornel was born in 1864 Australia, but he and his family returned to Kirkcudbight two years later. After studying art in Edinburgh, Hornel with William MacGeorge from Castle Douglas, attended the Académie Royale Des eaux Arts in Antwerp, where their tutor, Charles Verlat, was renowned for his vigorous brushwork and adventurous colours.

Although initially a naturalistic painter Hornel, as early as 1885, introduced decorative elements to his paintings, as in 'Resting', the first of many works, depicting girls in a woodland setting. Hornel worked on this subject over the next 20 years, as did other Galloway artists like W.S. MacGregor, Tom Blacklock, William Mouncey, mes Guthrie and George Henry.

Although his preoccupation with painting hildren might appear unhealthy to the modern eye, it's believed that he found in them a popular lucrative theme. Early in his career. Hornel associated with the Glasgow Boys, the artists' group drawn to realism and painting country enes 'en plein air'.

It was mainly through Hornel's vitality and harisma that Kirkcudbright became the favoured ainting-ground of several Glasgow Boys. W.S. MacGeorge, Tom Blacklock, William Mouncey and Hanna Clark settled in the town, while George Henry, James Guthrie, David Gauld and W. Y. MacGregor paid frequent visits.

From 1889-1895, Hornel, George Henry and David Gauld, began a decorative trend in their paintings, resulting in their most original and controversial work ever. Henry and Hornel believed that expression in paint was as important as subject-matter. They worked on trees and oodland, with low tones and a flattening of erspective.

This practice, along with the introduction of inding streams, are two important elements in Japanese prints. In 1893 Henry and Hornel visited Japan. Since 1851, when the country opened its borders to foreigners for the first time in 200 years Westerners became preoccupied with Japanese art

The Glasgow art dealer, Alexander Reid aid for the trip and although their 13 months had to broaden his appeal, so line and form took





precedence over pattern and colour. Abandoning pure colour, he concentrated on young girls in a decorative rural setting. As he was no great draughtsman, Hornel used a camera instead of a sketchbook. On his death in 1933, the artist left cache of photographic plates of young girls. These local children were chaperoned by Hornel's sister, Elizabeth, photographed by a Kirkcudbright professional and the results served as the basis for the artist's paintings. 'E A Hornel: From Camera to Canvas'

November 7, 2020 - 14 February 14, 2021), presented by the City Art Centre, Edinburgh and the National Trust for Scotland, is the first major exhibition in 35 years of E A Hornel's work. Cared for by the National Trust for Scotland

at Broughton House, Kirkcudbright, Hornel's home from 1901-1933, the artist's collection includes 1,700 photographs, used for his paintings. He acquired them from friends, bought or 'took' them mself at home or while travelling in Japan, Sri anka and Myanmar. Crucial to the development of his technique.


this exhibition shows that from 1890, photography is present in every area of Hornel's painting However, these compositions make uncomfortable viewing. While the Scottish girls are chaperoned, their Sri Lankan or Myanmar counterpart are represented in an overly intimate manner Preoccupied with stereotypical oriental motifs, the artist allows these girls little individuality, while in Kirkcudbright they are idealised.

Although Hornel was one of the most dventurous artists of his time, he was undoubtedly complex character. He drank heavily and after a long friendship with William MacGeorge, he fell out with him when his friend lectured him on his excessive drinking. William Mouncey, who married Hornel's sister, also quarrelled with him.

In spite of his fractiousness, Hornel's correspondence shows that he had a wide network of artist friends to whom he offered accommodation when visiting Kirkcudbright Dorothy L. Sayers' detective novel, 'Five Red Herrings' (1931) about seven Kirkcudbright artists, s supposedly based on local figures with the curmudgeonly Gowan modelled on Hornel.

Savers once called on the artist at Broughton House, exiting quickly, complaining about his rudeness. He was admired rather than loved and in later years, he served in local civic roles and in 1925 was appointed Honorary Sheriff Substitute









By 1910, possibly due to deteriorating eyesight, his work became formulaic but in his later years, he was more interested in his Burns and Dumfriesshire and Galloway library collection, which he paid for by selling his paintings.

Locally, he was seen in his Lovat Green knicker-bocker suit with monocle and, although intimidating, he could be kind and would 'leave his studio door open at night for tramps to take refuge

In 1897 Hornel proposed a permanent gallery for Kirkcudbright but the town had to wait until 2018 when his wish was granted, with the opening of the Kirkcudbright Galleries. This venue is a fitting tribute to a town that boasted (during the late Hornel, 1907, glass plat 19th century), some of the most progressive and significant paintings to come out of Scotland, if not Below: Ceylon Water Great Britain.



Scottish Art – Yet Another Story...

I HAVE A CONFESSION to make, in fact, two. Prior to receiving Lachlan Goudie's The Story of Scottish Art for review I had not seen any of his ty programmes about Scottish art; secondly, I was initially very sniffy about the content of his new publication: 'Do we really need another book about Scottish art?' I asked myself.

I am glad to say that I've rectified the first omission and changed my mind on the second question. Goudie is an excellent broadcaster fresh, intelligent and enthusiastic. He has a light touch and wears his learning delicately, so that his words appear unrehearsed and easily understood.

The Story of Scottish Art, based on the tv series of the same name, has the same breezy, personal tone, even if it is underpinned by significant research.

Goudie's father Alexander, who died in 2004, was also a painter and taught at Glasgow School of Art for many years. Like his son, the elder Goudie, he also had

a significant association with the Scottish Gallery, which hosted a retrospective in 2011. He found fame as a portraitist and as documenter of rural life. particularly in Brittany. where his wife Marie-René e was born.

Currently, the younger Goudie, who studied English at Cambridge University and later. Fine Art at Camberwell in London is clearly riding the crest of a wave, has a major show at the Scottish Gallery.

A recent review of The highlighted by Goudie.

These include Katherine Read (1723 – 1778), Christina Robertson (1796-1854), Bessie MacNicol (1869-1904), Frances Macdonald (1873-1921), Alice Meredith Williams (1877-1934) and Joan Eardley (1921-1963).

Goudie mentions several other contemporary and near-contemporary female artists such as Alison Watt, Jenny Saville and Christine Borland. In the context of Borland's Term and Contested Practice (1996), which also features writing by Sam Ainsley and Craig Richardson, among others?

Ainsley, who headed up the MFA degree at GSA for many years is also an artist of considerable note and she is one of many significant artists that Goudie's book fails to mention – although Sandy Moffat (also of GSA), who comprised one third of the artistic 'thinktank' AHM (with Ainsley and Harding) is acknowledged.

No study of this scope arrives in a vacuum and Goudie has clearly done his homework, even if it is skewed towards painting and the historical, rather than the conceptual, sculptural and contemporary.

In his suggestions for further reading, one notes a number of significant general and specific studies of Scottish art including David and Francina Irwin's Scottish Painters at Home and Abroad 1700-1990 (1975), Jude Burkhauser's

Glasgow Girls: Women in Art and Design 1880-1920 (1990), Roger Billcliffe's Charles Rennie Mackintosh and the Art of the Four (2017), Murdo MacDonald's Scottish Art (2000), Duncan MacMillan's Scottish Art 1460-1990 (1990) and Alice Strang's Modern Scottish Women: Painters and

Sculptors 1885-1965 (2015). On a personal note I was pleased to read Goudie's acknowledgement of Richard Demarco's profound influence on the story of Scottish art by inviting
