

## **Guide** Inverleith's new Gateway Richard Carr approves of the new approach to Edinburgh's Botanic Garden

Aberdeen

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THE NEW building that marks the enrance to the Royal Botanic Garden in Edinburgh off Inverleith Terrace both celebrates the Botanic's history and creates a setting that reflects the layout of the gardens and their contents, as well as establishing high standards of environmental design. The Botanic's history is reflected in e name of the building – the John Hope Gateway – which honours John Hope, an 18th century Regius Keeper who was pas-

ionately interested in growing and experienting on plants - especially trees - and n keeping up with what was happening in he rest of the world. In its geographical relationship to the Botanics, the layout of the John Hope Gateway reflects the contours, paths and mature ndscape of the trees around it, rather than the streets and squares of the New Town nearby. Thus the entrance sits on an impor tant crossing: the long axis from Inverleith

Park leading up to the Inverleith House Gallery, and the perimeter circular path around the garden. And, instead of being an 'object' that sits in e landscape, the John Hope Gateway provides a framed view of the garden seen between slate walls capped by the projecting timber roof. Once inside e building, routes and views across the building radiate from a central hall that looks out to the landscape beyond, allowing the building to frame

the views As the architects, Edward Cullinan Archiects, put it: "In this way, the building can be nderstood as a lens or filter in which both the rden and the daily activities of the institution are ought into focus for the visitor."

Notable, too, is the fact that the building has front or back: everywhere is a front with entry doors approached on different levels and from all directions. The fluidity of the composition is demonstrated by the way the exhibitions and shop on he ground floor extend into the surrounding landcape while, upstairs, a restaurant, private dining oom and offices overlook what is going on below

Given the vagaries of Edinburgh's weather, ohn Hope Gateway has to serve as a sanctuary so for the architects, it is the building's margins that are interesting: the places where you can sit with warm drink in your hands, protected against the wind and the rain yet still able to watch and smell the garden. There are also places outside that are

heltered by deep overhangs. Similarly, carved out from the curved conours of the open-plan exhibition space on the round floor is a 60m long curving window that ooks out on to a new biodiversity garden. Working with the Botanic's horticultural team, the designer Gross Max, has created a rich new living plant ollection that is to be viewed in three ways: from side the building, as a sort of botanical aquarium rom within the garden itself, when it can be exblored by following a zig-zag path; and from above, hen it can be studied from the outdoor terraces. If one enters the John Hope Gateway from

Inverleith Terrace, one passes through a glass porch designed so that the first view is of the garden beyond. Then, as the concrete floor rises gently, the visitor is led to the reception desk with the shop to the left, while to the right is a temporary exhibition space. Beyond that is the spacious exhibition hall and its dominant feature - the helical stair in veneered Douglas fir. This rises to the first floor.

Here, much of the space is taken up with the restaurant and its adjoining balcony overlooking the biodiversity garden already mentioned, while the private dining room can be hired for corporate entertaining, wedding receptions etc.

In preparation for designing the exhibitions in the John Hope Gateway, curator Mairi Gillies and designer Graham Russell talked to people who regularly visited the Botanics as well as to those who came only occasionally, and then set about creating as diverse an experience as that provided by the garden outside.

"We have combined discovery with participation, merging the boundaries between science and art, exhibition and event, and learning and play."

The John Hope Gateway's use of various timbers - Douglas fir, white pine, Scottish larch and spruce - does much to create its warm atmo-

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phere, while the Caithness slate dry walling aesthetically appealing (and its tin cracks may provide homes for small birds and bats). Similarly, the flat, greed sedum roof provides excellent insulation and has already been colonized by butterflies, birds and insects


Other ecologically beneficial features nclude the wind turbine on the roof; the collection of rainwater on the roof that is used for flushing toilets: the solar panels (also on the roof) that provide all the hot water needed in the summer; and the biomass boiler, fed by woodchips, that will heat the building in the winter using an underfloor system and heating elements suspended from the ceiling.

There are also panels on the southern side of the building that reflect sunlight into the offices to reduce the need for artificial

The John Hope Gateway is an adventur ous and environmentally advanced building that joins others in Scotland (like the visitors' centre in Culloden that we reviewed in ArtWork xxx) of equal standing.

Now all that remains to be seen is how the Douglas fir cladding on the outside weathers; whether the southern faç ade can be tidied up a bit; and whether the helical staircase can be stabilized (there were problems when I visited).

It would be helpful if the small booklet on the centre were redesigned so that its ground floor plan becomes legible (even using a powerful magnifying glass!). It looks as if the map was inserted by the designer of the booklet just to fill in a space. Hardly the way to do things!

## Mount Stuart revisited

SIXTY YEARS ago, the Isle of Bute was the prime destination for Glaswegians when they had their summer holidays. Then, when they discovered the pleasures of beaches in southern Spain and could get to them on packaged holidays, the Isle of Bute went into decline.

Mount Stuart are now freely open all year round and have a visitor centre that is open during the tourist season, as is Mount Stuart itself.

Another boost to the island's rejuvenation has been the creation of a marina and this is being followed by the restoration of the A listed Rothesay Pavilion, an art deco gem designed by J & JA Carrick in the 1930s.

Argvll & Bute Council appointed the Prince's Regeneration Trust to do an appraisal of the building last year and the council has now appointed Elder & Cannon to come up with a design and feasibility study to upgrade the structure and give it a viable future. The architects will then refurbish it.

The council is to be congratu lated on its decision to restore the pavilion at a time when the future of many listed buildings under local authority care is threatened because of financial cutbacks.

One such building is the B listed Lady Matheson Seminary in Stornoway, which the Lewis & Harris Buildings Preservation Trust had hoped to convert into a music school. The Western Isles Council has been accused of breaking promises to provide funding and the preservation trust has been wound up. It seems likely the seminary will be demolished.

Disaster struck in February at he Green Door Studios in Highgate. Kendal. The Green Door group was formed by a collective of half dozen local contemporary artists 5 years ago. Most were newly out of university and needing working

Jill Pemberton, a founder member, said: "Rather than them getting spaces in Leeds, London or Manchester, it seemed vital to us that we kept them in Cumbria, rather than Cumbria being known only as a Farfield Mill arts and heritage centre place for Lakeland artists.

Premises for six studios vere found and a year later 14 vork spaces were created in the onservative Party offices building Highgate, behind a green door. Other artists, although not needing studio space, wanted a connection Door group, so became associate embers

Green Door became the busy b of a network of about 80 artists ving and working in the area. On the way Green Door artists have been involved in many community rojects, together and singly. They ave won awards in the annual Big Draw competition, held local and touring exhibitions, run workshops in and out of schools and promoted

But on the night of February hurt but the studios were destroyed Some artists lost all their work and materials to the flames. More was damaged beyond salvage by smoke and water as firemen fought the blaze.

"South Lakeland District Council were brilliant," Pemberton said

"They gave us a regeneration grant so that artists could get going again and there were offers of help with spaces and furniture.'

Four artists have gone to near Sedbergh, others have moved to premises at nearby Staveley or found space at home, but most took up temporary residence at Kendal College, where South Lakeland Council had negotiated studio space for six months

Kendal's Brewerv Arts Centre with or wanted to support the Green and local musicians are among those painting on silk, batik, stone-carved who have rallied round to help raise sculpture, jewellery, textile art, and funds, with the Brewery hosting art workshops, an art auction and a night of live music.

But now the college building has been taken back for educational purposes and one hope of a new permanent base has faded. Being omeless again throws the future into an uncertainty which might ompt wider discussion. For one thing, a new home

might entail new and larger nmitments and if it means major fundraising it's the wrong time.

"At the moment we have decided to take a step back and have a really big think about what direction we want to take," Pemberton said. "We are taking advice about which way we go and how to do it.

"We want to stay together if possible, but it's finding the right format.

"The ideal would be to have a place in Kendal, but the rates and rents are so high.'

And perhaps new blood is needed to drive the group on "young artists hungry for space," she said.

But Pemberton added: "We are pretty positive it's going to happen in the next year."

In the meantime Green Door is focussing on the art trail this month, when about 40 artists are opening their studios to the public and showing paintings, prints, ceramics glass sculpture.

As Green Door member Karen Lloyd put it: "It's the biggest event of the year for us and we have gone all out this time.

IT SEEMS odd that Scotland should provide the inspiration for Sylvain Chomet's "exquisite, gentle, comic and elegiac animated film" (Philip French) based on an unused script by Jacques Tati, who died in 1982. It is also surprising that the film was made in Edinburgh

The film, called The Illusionist, is semi-autobiographical and stars a character based on Tati himself. During the film, he travels from London to Edinburgh and thence to the Western Isles, where Chomet recalls visiting a pub that had no electricity, was still lit by oil lamps and had a beautiful atmosphere. This reminded Chomet that

Tati hated modernity (as shown by his films, Plavtime and Traffic). and loved fantasy and magic and

the play of the imagination. What also appealed to Chomet were the melancholic quality of the Western Isles and the Scottish skies. "They were always moving," he says.

The film uses soft, pale co lours, recalling late 19th century French posters and is beautifully drawn, with computers being used only to create movement.

"In fact," says Chomet, "finding art students who can draw beau tifully is becoming increasingly difficult since most are wedded to computers.'

Scottish art schools please note. They have stuck longer than those in England to drawing from the life model and this practice, under threat from the seductive screen. should not be abandoned.

## Jim Munro's Creative Notes

A MEMORIAL retrospective exhibition celebrating the creative diversity of the art eacher and musician James Munro has been ounted at Dalkeith Arts Centre by the artist's family, with the support of the Arts & Creativity Feam and the Library Service of Midlothian ouncil

Jim Munro, first Principal Teacher of Art and Design at Greenhall High School, Gorebridge was an innovator, who fused his passion for performing jazz music with creating sculpture. and recognised the need for cross-curricular exploration to enhance a skills base and to prepare students for the real world.

He promoted the performance of music alongside the introduction of stone carving, ceramic work and sculptural metalwork. taking expression and opportunity beyond the conventions of drawing and painting. However, e came to lament the power of 'health & afety' policies which he blamed for gradually antling the traditional skill-based training

## A spot of local Sedition

Denis Inch charts an uprising amongst Cumbria's contemporary artists

THINK of Cumbria and think of art and the picture that pops up is likely to include some of those myriads of views of lakes and fells which have been painted over the vears. After all, the county can claim to

have the jewel in the crown of English scenery and it's long been a magnet for painters. But, as visitors discover, often to their surprise, Cumbria isn't all Lake District. It's at the world through human less easy to discover, perhaps, that not all local artists are making pictures based on the scenic delights of the national park.

Work by less landscape-focussed Cumbria-based artists is as likely to be found in Bristol as Barrow, or even in Texas, Vienna or Tanzania, as in Kendal or Whitehaven. But now work by a score of them is going on show in Carlisle under the banner of that popular conception of the Cumbrian artist

The exhibition at Tullie House will give perhaps the most wide-ranging display of artists came out of their studios en masse and showed the rest of the county and the region what they were doing.

Sedition promises to be even more of an eye-opener. It's significant that only one of the artists is a painter – and it's hard to pin a firm traditional label on many of the rest.



# An outsider comes inside

### Denis Inch visits a painter who has finally found herself - in the Dumfries countryside

NOT LONG ago Bea Last was painting, in an ncreasingly abstract way, her reactions to the andscapes of her adopted home in south-west cotland. Now her vision has shifted inwards.

"A few years ago there was a definite relationhip to the physical world in my paintings – you could see lines relating to the horizon or to trees,' she savs.

"Now it is about my internal landscape. Γhrough my work I am getting a better understanding of myself."

In conversation in her studio near Castle Douglas, where she was preparing for a solo show n Dumfries, she listed what her work is not.

"I look at my paintings and they don't come nder the bracket of Scottish art. for example the tradition of the Colourists, or under the bracket of, especially here in Dumfries and Galloway, tradinal realistic landscape."

So her work has come to be more about herself, and if she is outside the regional and national tradition, she recognises herself as often having een an outsider in her life.

She was born in Cyprus into a service family hich was always on the move, her father being in the RAF.

"I have a Maltese mother but I am not Malsavs. "I don't know where I come from. Now I live sure Centre in Stranraer and from the Dumfries n Scotland, which is fantastic, but I am not Scot-

"The Scots have a pride in their heritage and eing able to share in the same way, for example, their feelings about the Glasgow Girls or Glasgow School of Art.

Bea Last did not fit in, either, with family expectations when it came to higher education. She wanted to go to art school. Girls didn't go to art chool, the family said. She went in the end, but the family insisted that there should be a chance of 'proper job' at the end of it.

The compromise resulted in a BA in illustra-

part of Westminster University.

"But I am grateful to art school because of what it does for you personally," she said. "It opens ruefully, in which she tried to get on with developyou up to all sorts of things and gives you a sense of discipline.3

She worked as a book illustrator in the eighties, but found that publishers' and agencies' demands were too restricting. She didn't fit in there, either.

Set design was more enjoyable, she found, working with a fringe theatre based over a pub in Chiswick, where everyone had at least two functions – she did the publicity as well.

From there she went into community arts. working with young people and getting into graffiti of her studio. And they have gained in a sense of before it became trendy.

But she wanted to paint about how she felt, so strokes which cost her muscles so much pain. she moved to Kingston upon Thames and took a studio on Eel Pie Island, then home to a community of artists and the scene of Rolling Stones parties. and black, gives an impression of forces held in

Eventually came the decision 16 years ago to move to a part of Scotland she had often visited over the years to see friends.

Since then her work has been exhibited in Italy and France as well as Scotland and corporate commissions and purchases have come from companies in Chicago, Atlanta and London as well as ese. My father was Welsh but I am not Welsh," she Dumfries and Galloway Council for the Ryan Leiand Galloway Royal Infirmary in Dumfries.

In reaction to a noisy world overloaded with information and stimulation, she began moving where they live," she adds, recognising it but not away from figurative and realistic painting to produce works which were quieter and more meditative

Two or three years ago she was covering canvases with layers of gesso to produce a textured base on which she put a yellow ground, adding fields of warm reds and oranges or cool blues to produce glowing works related to quiet moments in the local landscape.

For the last year or so she has been supported by a visual arts development award from the Scot- Gracefield Arts Centre, Edinburgh Road, Dum-

and Dumfries and Galloway Regional Council. It's been a challenging year, Bea Last smiles ing her work while dogged by incidents such as a broken foot, food poisoning and being laid off with badly strained muscles caused by prolonged energetic work on big paintings.

Now her work has become in some ways simpler. The textures went out when she realised they no longer meant anything. The hues are more subdued, earth colours like ochres and siennas set off by black and white.

But the pictures have got bigger, 70 inches square, only just small enough to get in and out energy and dynamics through the big, broad brush-

The earliest of the half-dozen canvases she is exhibiting in Dumfries, painted mostly in ochre equilibrium. The next, with curved strokes in rich browns and oranges against white and black, looks like energy in check.

The latest, with colours reduced to black and white, has the exploding energy of a firecracker or a frog's leap

The exhibition includes her sketchbooks showing how she worked her way towards these paintings, how she has found lines that delighted her in their beauty and simplicity.

Bea Last says her paintings are emotional and intuitive, about expressing her own feelings, but she gives them obscure titles so that viewers may feel freer to take whatever they want from them for themselves and not be led to what to think or feel about them.

Working outside the tradition that surrounded her, she couldn't place her paintings for a long time.Now she says: "All these are about fitting in Now I am thinking it's OK not to fit in." DENIS INCH

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## An end to production line grants?

I SUSPECT that this will not be popular with some beople, however, I am going to say it anyway.

We are, as everyone knows, in a recession and re constantly being told that cutbacks in public spending are on the way. I say 'good' because hope-Illy, when the cuts bite, they might firmly grip the omplacent behinds of a select group of artists and craftspeople who are at present sponging up public oney to fund personal ventures.

Pick up glossy local council arts news brochures in any area of the country and you will notice that councils fork out cash willy-nilly on no particular bais of need to artists to fund private initiatives, money or framing, printing promotional material, materials create new work and put on exhibitions etc.

I am not talking about a few guid here either: ms of up to £1000 (possibly more) are being handed out on a regular basis to individual artists for this kind of exercise.

My question is this: "Why do they not pay for se themselves?" I know that I have to and I also know the reason why that is (apart from the fact that ] would rather do so).

First, I did not go through art college, I gained B.A. in Art History and Humanities through The Open University, I can, due to quite a few years of experience though, testify that an art college backund is an advantage in this respect.

Second, I am not expert (nor interested) in the process of grant form filling or fulfilling the sort of criteria that councils are after when dishing out cash for example, I might not want to create a body of work dedicated to the environment or local heritage. night (shock, horror) want to tackle something dif ent. Therefore, I will not get the money. Likewise, books (highly unlikely), therefore. I will not get the

I do not believe that this production line of nediocre art is a healthy way to promote creativity. Whatever happened to the idea of necessity being the mother of invention? Could it be that something is being lost along the way?

Is it not the case that hunger and need often pro vide the catalyst for an artist to be creative and, more crucially, the impetus to create with a passion? Obviously not, just as councils are programmed to supply streetlights and rubbish bins, it now seems obligatory that they must supply art as well.

I am convinced that all this financial propping up to a select few (for the most part caused by council's blind duty to spend allocated funds) is not conducive to the promotion of a fair and inclusive creative community.

And there are moral issues to consider. For example, why pay artists to make social comment or ecology (a big favourite) or heritage, and the like?

This seems hypocritical: why not use the money directly on improving the environment and sustainin seums and public art galleries instead?

Or another example: say I wanted to comment, through the medium of visual art, on global poverty. I feel I would have more integrity as an artist if I paid for materials and costs myself and donated any grant monies available to OXFAM or the Red Cross.

Do we really want an artistic environment dictated by what is acceptably marketable, slick and always looks the part? Or should diversity and innovation be encouraged more, even if the end product is less uniform and a bit rougher around the edges? CATH BELI

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
