

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
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Jkrainian oices: 23.02

EARLIER this year, a group of people from Ukraine arrived in West Lothian. They were, of course, not here by choice, but were seeking refuge from the devastating war taking place in their home country

As a way to welcome them, West Lothian College arranged a get together between relevant parties including college staff, host families and the Ukrainian people. This arrangement resulted in positive connections being made, one of these being a meeting between artists working at the EP Spaces (Edinburgh Printmakers Spaces) studios in Livingston and two young Ukrainian artists Vika Vasynska and Ira Andreichuk.

It was soon realised that Vika and Ira were keen to continue with the work they had unexpectedly left behind. It was clear that they wanted to put some kind of normality back in their lives in order to counter the chaos they had been experiencing. After some discussion, it was decided that an effort should be made to put on an exhibition of their respective artwork.


Vika is a photo-journalist from Kyiv and Ira is

a graphic-designer. The title they chose 23.02 represents for them the last day of normality before the brutal Russian invasion on February 24. 2022.

The subtitle Ukrainian Voices alludes to the significant amount of text featured in the exhibition. The textual content is particularly present in Vika's work where a series of black and white portraits are

all accompanied by written testimonials from the sitters. Vika began her series The Portrait of a Soldier in 2014 when Russia annexed Crimea from Ukraine. The series comprises of photographs of soldiers who were determined to defend their homeland, many were called up and many volunteered.

In the exhibition this powerful group of photographs are shown alongside the equally powerful small selection of another related series



Sons and Mothers.

Here, Vika artfully captures the moving bond between mothers and their children. Both sad and profound, the mothers are shown holding photographs of their sonsm, all of whom have been killed during the conflict.

Very sadly, all the soldiers who sat for Vika

shown in this exhibition have been victims of the war and have needlessly lost their lives.

These portraits combined with the direct testimonials from the soldiers and their mothers contribute to a heart-rending living history which, in some ways, is more immediate and meaningful than television and online news. Although this is only a small selection of the original project

that Vika undertook, it gives the viewer an albeit unhappy insight into what it means to be in the situation that many Ukrainians find themselves in.

Ira Andreichuk, the other artist featured in the exhibition, is a graphic-designer who completed her Master's Degree in Liviv, after this she worked in a theatre in her home town in the Carpathian mountains. At the outbreak of the war the theatre became a bomb shelter and the stage was used to produce camouflage nets.

Now Ira is kindly hosted by a family living in West Lothian, however, she still has vivid memories of the months she spent in Ukraine after the invasion in February 2022. These experiences have become a vehicle for her to express her feelings and her vision of that terrifying time

In her digital paintings produced while living in Scotland, she vividly portrays what that time was like, for example, total blackout with only the eerie light from the moon. She remembers late, dark night vigils by the light of small candles held for local fallen heroes. She portrays, with a chilling sense of atmosphere, the feeling of being in an underground shelter with the unsaid thoughts of people all thinking the same thing but not wanting to say it out loud in case it would make it feel real.

This is a relatively small exhibition, however, it delivers a powerful message. As one of the team who put it together, I can speak for all of us who were keen to bring it to the attention of the public as soon as possible.

As mentioned previously, and while the events risk slipping down the television news in terms of importance, it is another medium by which to illustrate how lives have been destroyed and lost due to callous and inhumane actions.

Long Live the King!

Maxwell Macleeod sings the praises of Charles the Third, a former school mate he "sat next door to at pottery classes" and learned to "like and admire hugely."

I WAS AT SCHOOL with Prince. correction, King Charles the Third, and I would like to write a few words in his support, because I feel that in these tempestuous times he is not only going to need them, but deserves them

First. a little context. I hardly knew the man, we only overlapped at Gordonstoun for a few terms, I doubt he even knew my name and I am writing not so much in the support of the monarchy as in support of him personally as circumstances dictated that I had a bit of a ringside seat of him.

We sang in the same choir, rehearsed together when he was playing Macbeth and I had a junior part and even sat next door to each other in pottery classes when he was making an exquisite coffee set for his Granny and I was just making a mess.

But I learned to like and admire him hugely. Indeed, if you accept the need for a monarch, which I do, I can think of nobody better suited to the role. Hence this

Let me also add that this is only the second time I have written about him, as he surely deserves the privacy of his formative years. But needs must and I would suggest that he could play a pivotal role in leading the country out of its current crisis. So, permit me just a couple of memories. First. he was hugely talented. He played good trumpet and indeed the cello, painted reasonably and as I said early had a real talent as a potter.

When we were out on tour with the choir he endured the utterly grotesque hounding by the press with a cheerful tolerance and showed an exceptional kindness to me a small. much bullied red haired boy, who like himself, had been sent to the wrong school and utterly hated

Now, as I say, we were not friends but in the intervening years I have naturally watched his career with an appropriate fascination. I thought then that it was

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wrong that someone so artistic and sensitive should have been sent to such a brutal school; thought it wrong that any human being should be so chased and harassed and pondered that someone who was perhaps best suited to become an architect and live a quiet and thoughtful life down some remote glen should be forced to have to live a hideous life in a global sized goldfish bowl where even his tiniest fart would be witnessed and pilloried around the world. Even then when I was a snotty nosed thirteen year old I wanted to save him. Still do. That's why I

And I have never felt that sense more strongly than today. Dear God, never mind her rightly revered majesty, it's Charles I near weep for.

What a fate! A country on the brink of the worst recession in forty years, a trade union movement who are girding their loins to howl their fury, and cause social disorder (entirely understandably) at the ever growing distance between the haves and the have-nots and the very likely possibility of the furtherance of a system in which there will quite possibly be malnutrition in countless homes across the nation whist so many of the rich do little but feel smug.

What a month, nay what a week, to become monarch. Possibly the worst in half a century.

And yet and yet. If we had an empty pad on which to design the perfect monarch to cope with today's crisis what

characteristics would be include in our

First, it would have to be someone who was different, odd even, an artist, a sensitive soul who had known rejection and misery and who in seventy years of training for the job had become quite possibly one of the most experienced of visitors to the sink estates of Britain. a man who, in the face of derision, had announced that he wanted to be the titular head not of just the Christians of Britain but those of all faith and none.

An extraordinary human being who is flexible in his attitudes, brave and daringly different.

Yes, he has followed some unconventional paths. I wouldn't wish it any other way. Nor would I have expected it all those years ago.

Never mind the arguments over whether we should have a monarchy, as the outpouring of grief over the Queen's death has shown, there is still a need for good honest leadership that isn't political. It's absurd I know, but we are not rational beings, we are human beings, and bonkers though it may seem, there is still an atavistic need for Charles to be a Great King amongst a sizeable part of the community.

King Charles the Third be able to pull something out of the bag? I think he has the potential to do it. I'm firmly on his side.

The Queen is dead! God save the King!




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

Burns reborn

Tessa Williams catches up with the Alan Cumming stage show 'Burn'

ROBERT BURNS, one of Scotland's greatest ever literary figures, celebrated in kilts the world over at Burns nights from Beijing to Toronto, unites the Scottish people in their search for a national hero. But now the image of Robbie Burns has been given a Hollywood make-over, presenting him as a mentally tortured womanising genius who lived from hand to mouth in the 18th century. He now seems a lot more attractive in a kind of loser/edgy broken artist type way.

Alan Cumming, the 57 year old Scottish star from Aberfeldy who conquered Hollywood in all its glory, a genius actor and writer and now it seems a superb dancer too, has been a leading theatrical light since the 1980s.

Now he has reworked the life of Burns into a 2022 post-Covid-friendly extravaganza, with an unusual tour de force one man show. The show he created, with the award winning choreographer Steven Hoggett, crosses the realms of rave/ballet and contemporary dance. It's a fantastic hour long spectacle that keeps you on the edge of your seat as we see Burns going through his life and eventually being laid low by

It has an interesting stage set - using old lace-up high heel shoes to represent the women in Burns's life and lots of bold text screened on to the back of the theatre wall.

The play has already toured much of Scotland and next month it opens in New York at the Joyce Theatre on 8th Avenue.

Watching the show though, you are bound to wonder if Cumming had not had the massive world wide Hollywood success himself, winning more awards in theatre and film than you can shake a stick at, would he have had the chutzpah and confidence to present this new radical image of Burns?

A bleeding heart poet, suffering mental health problems. (like we all do) with an addiction to alcohol and women (fathering over 12 children in his short life) could any one else have had the nerve to do this?

It's a bold approach, but it seems to have appealed to a lot of people. "And still my motto is I dare' Cumming quotes aptly in the show – one its most poignant lines.

It's a splendid performance and sees Cumming as a dancer on his own on the stage for 90 minutes. Okay, we all know Burns loved his women, had fathered more than 12 children in his short life, sadly passing away at just 37 years of age of heart failure,

But did we know he suffered mental illness? Cumming surmised: "I think Burns invented selfesteem. There wasn't really a word for that then, but A Man's a Man For A' That is really about self-esteem. He's saying the poor person who must struggle should have more respect from us than a rich person because of what they've had

to do to maintain themselves. And I think that's a great thing - he values struggle and the working person's experience and gives them a voice.

Like many artists and writers, Burns's cultural

success was not matched by any kind of financial rewards. He tried a return to farming, and then worked for the unpopular Excise men. The years of pitiless farm labour took their toll of his health. Prematurely he died in Dumfries in 1796, at the age of just 37. It is not enough to describe him, as this "strapping

ploughman who just happened to knock off a few fabulous poems every now and then, and then shag

"The truth is a lot more complicated", Cumming says, after studying many of Burns's letters in great detail.

"He was very fragile

and delicate and a hot mess. Terrible things happened

Alan has had a growing obsession with Robert Burns over the years.

"He's omnipresent in our lives as Scottish people, but as I got older I wondered more about him, about the holistic version of him.

"And then the more I got to understand him and read his letters, the more I saw there is a side I don't think we realise. A darker side and a more fragile side".

The show has an almost pantomime use of props. At one point, Burns abandons his writing to caper across the stage – as the white feather quill he was using continues to scratch its way across the page, in a moment of Harry Potter-esque theatrical magic.

At another, the women he obsesses over appear as a row of delicate 18th-century women's shoes, suspended in the air on fine wires.

Cumming reads Burns's verse beautifully, before reaching a wonderful ending where he comes out from behind the curtain with a glass and addresses Auld Lang Syne to the audience. You almost think everyone will join in!

His voice makes Burns come alive in a way that his movements can't, giving heart to this eccentric and idealised resurrection of a storied poet.

What might be next, one wonders, a revamped life of Robert Louis Stevenson as a gay icon?

Ladies who paint: a neglected plant speaks!

Nick Jones talks exclusively to a Field Woundwort spokesman

MOST PEOPLE don't notice me, or even know that geology and archaeology. my kind exist. That's because we're 'ballast flora', itinerant, migrant, often unwelcome, and sometimes difficult to identify. Observant too. With our way of life, we need to be sharp, you never know who's taking an interest, or why.

That's how I got interested in ladies who painted flowers, back in Victorian times. It was Miss Dickinson who set me off, when she spotted me in August 1856 on the edge of a field near Cornhill-on-Tweed.

I had been living happily near the Thames at Wapping, biding my time, waiting for the right conditions to flower. My seed drifted downwind to land on sandy gravel, which was then used as ballast, filling the hold of a brig sailing back to Berwick-upon-Tweed, helping it from capsizing in rough seas.

Somehow I made it to Cornhill-upon-Tweed, upstream from Norham (didn't see Turner on the bridge though, more's the pity!).

Margaret uprooted me (the indignity!) and took me home to paint. That should have finished me off, but now I have achieved a different kind of fame and a longer life. Thanks to loans from the Natural History Society of Northumbria and the Royal Horticultural Society you can get to see me, and more of her work at the Granary Gallery in Berwick-upon- Tweed, marking the centenary (plus one year) of her death in 1921 at the age of ninety-

Over her lifetime she collected over a thousand specimen for her herbarium. Back then many genteel womenfolk took up safe, decorous, gentle and ladylike pastimes, like needlework, playing the piano, or painting flowers.

Like Miss Dickinson. I'd say botanist first, then artist, with a great talent for close observation and precise recording. The daughter of a successful Tyneside tobacco manufacturer, the family moved to a grand house outside Melrose around 1860, when she was forty, and destined to be a lifelong spinster.

A decade later she was in Norham and by 1872 she had joined the Berwickshire Naturalists' Club. established in 1831, one of the first of many such clubs all over the country with an interest in botany.

Wealth, leisure, improved education, greater scientific knowledge, the expansion of the railways, more portable easels, paints and brushes; all these made finding, recording and painting flowers easier. The Berwickshire naturalists were a lively lot, organising field visits, like one to Holy Island in 1874. The Club Secretary, Dr Hardy, took Margaret under his wing, giving her the job of recording mosses and rare plants. Linda France's poem Portrait of the Artist as an Island Flower, says it all, I think, especially after I saw Rooted Beings, at London's Wellcome Collection, this summer.

At last humans are beginning to see how they need us just as much as we need them, and that we're cleverer than

In those days I was known as Corn Woundwort, stachys arvensis if you please, aka Field Woundwort. Of course, us flowers are something pretty special, no surprise that artists, poets and mystics are drawn to us.

Margaret? A bit of a dry old stick, you might say, she didn't capture my soul, but then, she wasn't tryin a g to, was she? Just happy to note my existence.

Narcissi were the closest she seemed to get to a grand passion, fascinating her so much that she painted some thirty cultivars between 1886 and 1893, even Narcissus poeticus, better known as Pheasant's Eve

Wonderfully, although lost for years, her Album of Narcissus Drawings was auctioned in 1996 and acquired for the Royal Horticultural ciety's Lindley Collections.

Lady artists definitely seem drawn to flowers, so Margaret was in good company. Her contemporaries, the Clifford family, made famous by Richard Mabey in *The Frampton Flora*, their work is so lively. Recently I asked a cousin. still living south of the Thames, to take me to

Kew Gardens. Being ballast flora, I always wanted to see all those different species that, like me, were shipped across the ocean wave.

Imagine my excitement when I discovered the Marianne North Gallery, and her extraordinary oeuvre (pardon my French!). What a lady! The David Attenborough of her time, intrepid, fearless, her passion and curiosity took her all over the world to discover and

contemporary way.

Favourite flowery places include Edinburgh's Botanics, Attadale (you can reach it by train on the Kyle line) and Inverewe Gardens, and the wilds of Wester Ross. I'm intrigued to see the variety of style and approach, and the group dynamic. Quite a contrast to Margaret's ploughing of her single but oh so fertile furrow!

A support for Covid sufferers

The artist Alec Finlay talks to Mary Gladstone about a collaborative project for a memorial to Covid sufferers in Glasgow's Pollok Park. Finlay, son of the Little Sparta creator Ian Hamilton Finlay, who is himself a victim of Long Covid, explains how inspiration for the project, SUPPORT, came from the use of tree supports in Japanese gardens

ALEC FINLAY'S childhood was unusual, if not entirely idyllic. His parents were Sue Finlay, co-creator of Stonypath or Little Sparta, a five acre garden situated on a windy hill in the Pentlands, near Dunsyre, Lanarkshire, and artist Ian Hamilton Finlay.

Alec acknowledges his early experiences at Stonypath were singular, particularly in summer "sailing wee boats and swimming in the lochan", but "winter was bare, dim and dreich".

Sometimes, when he and his younger sister, Aileen, came home from school, their mother or father, accompanied by Serpolette, a donkey, would meet them off the bus at the end of the track that led up to their cottage.

Born in Inverness in 1966, Finlay is now an internationallyrecognised artist, whose work incorporates poetry, sculpture. collage, audio-visual, neon and new technology. Given his upbringing, it's unsurprising that nature and landscape are an integral part of his oeuvre. Nest boxes, botanic and luggage labels, wind turbines and bee boles are some of his subjects.

The artist has exhibited at The Bluecoat, Tate Modern, Norwich Castle Museum, the Highland Institute of Contemporary Art and a gallery in Sofia, Bulgaria.

He was shortlisted for the Northern Art Prize and a finalist in the first ALICE Award (established in 2010 to showcase the best in contemporary art, both in quality and in terms of shaping human experience). He has published



over 20 books, edited anthologies and won Scottish Design Awards for his

For Alec, collaboration is important. Having grown up with his parents'

example of working together to create their garden, he saw how they combined their efforts to make something memorable. Sue, the real gardener, created Little Sparta's horticultural structure, while Ian built paths and

constructed ponds.

Alec's most recent collaborative project is Glasgow Pollok Park's Covid Memorial, a project initiated by The Herald newspaper, which set up a fund for the venture.

The memorial pays tribute to those who lost their lives to Covid 19. Consisting of 15 tree supports, the memorial was unveiled this summer on May 27.

Alec contracted Covid 19 early in 2020 and now suffers from Long Covid. On receiving the commission, the word, SUPPORT, came immediately to mind. He saw that during the early months of the pandemic, people had offered each other support, in different ways. This gave him the idea of making tree supports in the park.

'The concept for the memorial arose from an existing form - the tree support, especially those in Japanese gardens - which offer an image of vulnerability

and care, responsive to the crisis of our lifetime - an ongoing "mass disabling

He took photographs of bereaved families in a pose of support with a tree and they became the artwork. Rather than the artist himself making the memorial, Alec made it with people





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explains "to create a generous version of the shared mind.'

The memorial is ongoing and by March 2023 the supports in Pollok Park will through disability. "With disability comes increase to 40 structures. "It isn't really an experience of making 'art'. It's more one of trying to share in healing. I remember moments when individuals were moved, collaborating on photographs of people in poses of support, from which the designs evolved, conversations with those who lost loved ones and those broken by Long Covid.'

Accompanying these structures, is an audio-book in which a collection of memories of the bereaved are voiced by the actor, Robert Carlyle. Chris Watson was responsible for the sound design and Alec

"Robert's reading brought home the act of shared witness," says the artist. "It's the first collective account of the pandemic and Robert's voice expresses what we used to term the democratic intellect. We cried our eves out." Alec is prolific. Apart from his books, he has also exhibited solo and in group shows up and down the country. This is all the more impressive as he has suffered for over 35 years from chronic ill health. Like his mother Sue, founder of Action for ME, he contracted Myalgic Encephalomyelitits (ME) in his youth. This illness became an incentive for him to work creatively with other sufferers.

"For decades, the experience of people with ME is to have had their disease disbelieved and subject to harmful treatment. It's an erasure of reality on a mass scale. 'My' found poem, Descriptions, is a description of ME made by people with ME, using their words and, while it can't explain the exact reasons for the erasure of their experience, it makes it impossible to deny their reality.'

It's hard not to believe that Alec has been influenced by his father. Ian Hamilton Finlay's art. "There is a tradition of lyrical minimalism, which I breathed in from my father's bookcase like the poetry

For many who came across Ian Hamilton Finlay, he was an uncompromising man, renowned for conflict and battle, particularly with official organisations like the Scottish Arts Council (that was) and Strathclyde Regional Council (ditto).

"I'd draw a distinction between the lyrical poet and sometime rage of the man." Alec says of his father. Alec's way is less confrontational.

"Really the entire creative process is, to me, one of truth and reconciliation, which is what allows healing. That extends to nature itself: to admit the truth of the damage we've caused, and reconcile that, by healing - acknowledging the vulnerability of the landscape mirrors our own. So, for example, in the work I'm doing just now I might connect community woodland remediation to patient-led practices of recuperation. healing the body and the land.

"It took me years to realise that you can tell the truth, but in a spirit of forgiveness and understanding rather than accusation. Art is a place in which reality can be represented without seeking to take power over someone else, or making your own ego a frame for the world."

As a serious conceptual artist, who works in a variety of media, Alec Finlay responds resonantly and poetically to the 21st century zeitgeist which is personified by drastic damage to our environment and personal health.



Reasons for the 'insanity' of Brexit

to work on farm: the benefits scheme, past and present, prohibits the unemployed Brits, or those employed on zero hours contracts, dependent on supplementary benefits from taking any employment that is seasonal or temporary such as farming. If they do so, when the seasonal/ temporary job is done it will take from 6/8 weeks for their benefits to be approved and reinstated; much longer if they are messed about by our incompetent benefits system. This can lead to homelessness and too often has.

Re references to AC Grayling: I have read many articles such as this, written by the complacent, comfortable middle income that refuse to recognise the reality behind the insanity of Brexit.

You complain that Grayling was spiked by the BBC; despite this he has been heard often. The voice never heard is that of the people below his pay grade; our unskilled masses who out of sheer desperation voted for change – any change.

No one interviewed the people at the bottom, who had nothing to lose. The young living in our 'sink' estates or those attending our failing schools. The masses that were denied any skills training, now having to choose between food and their ever increasing rent.

The complacent, blinkered middle chose to believe our young were lazy and unskilled by 'choice' For three decades most of British industry and local government chose to ditch their costly training schemes in favour of the cheaper

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lack of housing – totally dependent on an ever increasing influx of skilled immigrants.

This condemned many of our own young to a future as unskilled labour on zero hours contracts, dependent on food banks to supplement their unstable limited incomes.

The benefits of EU membership were not shared. The result is the madness of Brexit. For the marginalised and ignored there was no other form of protest open to them. The fault lies with the UK system and policies; not the EU.

Brexit has forced the government to recognise the appalling lack of skills and earning power in our own neglected workforce and is now promising to deliver on what is most needed. That is a return to apprenticeships and skills training to give our young the skills they need to compete in the EU and in the world. Brexit is a high price to pay for Government neglect and stupidity.

If Brexit fails and the gap in opportunity and income between low and high paid continues to widen, the only other weapon will be the chaos of wide spread, crippling, strike action. This is already beginning.

Unboxed: Creativity in the UK, as the festival was - somewhat unsuccessfully - rebranded after a rather unfortunate birth as the Festival of Brexit, has turned out to be something of a fiasco.

With a mind boggling budget of £120 million (yes, no misprint), and aiming for an audience of 66 million (the population of the UK?) it is reported to have been seen by just 250,000 folk,

Some ten projects were chosen for backing. Shown above, parked in Market Square, Forres is the Dandelion's Cubes Bike Tour. A number of custom built electric powered cycles have travelled round Scotland "encouraging everyone to sow, grow and share food, but also music, knowledge and ideas.'

(half a dozen) crowd who turned up could not have been warmer. The promoters, a body by the name of Dandelion, organised a number of other such worthy events throughout Scotland with a reputed budget of some £8m.

Probably the most eccentric – and wildly costly - project has been something called See Monster, which has involved towing a redundant North Sea drilling platform to Weston-Super-Mare in Somerset and attempting to bedeck it in various forms of greenery and install a waterfall. Predicatbly, the venture is grotesquely behind schedule - and most probably way over budget.

The thinking behind this barmy idea is difficult to fathom. Understandably, the organisers are being economical with the facts, though the costs involved cannot be anything but staggering.

Maybe the original Brexit name was only too appropriate. Just blame Europe!



In today's music aleatoricism rules, ok?

TO EDINBURGH to hear Jordi Savall, Hesperion XXI, and guests exploring the life and music encountered by the 14th Century explorer Ibn Battuta, 'The Traveller of Time' across the Middle and Far East; and, Dimitrie Cantemir's 'Science of Music', published in Istanbul in 1710. Both concerts in tune with the Festival's theme addressing refuge, migration, identity and inclusion.

As Jordi says, "music cannot lie", welcoming and embracing change, becoming richer when diverse spiritual, cultural and intellectual traditions share and create together in tolerance and openness. So wonderful to hear, see and feel live music again, played by an ensemble who felt like old friends after watching and listening for hours on Youtube during

And yet....and yet. A sense that, as the world struggles to adapt to the effects of rising fuel costs, food shortages, and increasing inequality, exacerbated by war and climate change, the very themes that Jordi addresses - peace, tolerance, beauty and creativity transcending conflict, exploitation and cruelty - will surely manifest and express themselves through music and sound very differently in the future.

The privilege of being able to travel long distances, afford high ticket prices, and listen to inspiring musicians who themselves jet around the globe to make a living feels as though it is no longer sustainable or sensible, be it for the planet; or, in Auld Reekie's case, a creaking infrastructure, and long-suffering residents.

I wish it were otherwise, if only to protect the practice and livelihoods of so many musicians. Nobody likes unwelcome change. The Edinburgh Festival was born in 1947 as a way for artists and audiences to heal the wounds of global conflict after the horrors of World War through international and cultural collaboration. Now in its 75th year, it has returned in triumph from lock-down.

SO, WHERE NEXT? Smaller, more niche, festivals celebrating local talent, for a more local audience, perhaps? Or the best of both worlds, thinking local, and going global, thanks to the wonders of modern technology? That still doesn't really address the utterly different quality of actually being there, in the here and now. Which is why I so appreciate promoters like composer John Casken, and events like Wooler's international Wooler Arts Summer In his own music, John draws much inspiration for his multi-facetted many layered music from the literary, religious and cultural heritage of Northumberland, and a sense of place – its landscape, the sea, the Cheviots, Farne. To Fields We Do Not Know, for example, draws on The Venerable Bede, Basil Bunting, and Ezra Pound. It helps to know the texts, although underlying themes are universal; life's uncertain journey, seeking the unknown, wondering where we are going, looking for clues from forebears. Future performances include the world premiere of Light Into My Dark in Manchester on December 3, a setting of part of Kathleen Raine's Northumbrian Sequence for mezzo-soprano, chorus and orchestra, and the

London premiere at Wigmore Hall on January 26.

2023 of The Shackled King, an adaptation of King

Lear written for Sir John Tomlinson. AS I PEER AHEAD, thunderclouds gather over Arthur's Seat, and a sea haar enshrouds Edinburgh after another hot day. All I can see is a musical applecart overturned, all the old rules and assumptions scattered. Impossible to put back. Random, unpredictable interventions and compositions, barely facilitated, change the nature of what constitutes music, such that the word itself seems misleading and redundant. Moment to moment, there just is sound.... or silence.

Seeking guidance, I talk to Mike Worboys and Martin Parker. I would write "composers", but that seems loaded now, narrowing the mind when it needs to open to new ideas. Masters of the "Science of Music", like Cantemir? Much better!

For Mike Worboys, a mathematician and onetime Zen monk, "There is music in every sound if we can only hear it." He composes, hoping for listening experiences without preconceptions or expectations of narrative in the music. Sit, listen for a sense of presence, becoming one with sound. His compositions explore boundaries between art and science, building scores using mathematical frameworks. The results? Instrumental pieces and electro-acoustic works, like re-imagining Tallis's Spem in Alium, for forty synthesisers, and, last February, Presence/Absence, in Durham Cathedral, based on Zen chants and texts on non-duality of seemingly opposed notions.

He is founder and artistic director of the Berwick Music Series, String Theory, Music for Solo Strings, exploring links between Baroque and contemporary music, with concerts, lectures. an international composition competition, plus community and schools events, throughout September and October.

Enter stage left no longer applies in this world of sound designers, electro-acoustical synthesisers, interactive sonic installations, for here there is no distinction between audience and performer.

Aleatoricism rules, OK? Chance, to you and me, that is! You are composer, player, listener and participant; but so is wind, water, birdsong, silence, the washing machine, the mobile phone...you get the idea. This is Martin Parker's forte. Director of Edinburgh University's MSc in Sound Design, the title hardly does justice to the range, creativity, innovation, and exploratory nature of his work, or to the high esteem of his students around the world. Artistic Director of Edinburgh's Dialogues Festival, and currently head of the Reid School of Music, ongoing projects include devising ways in which phones can be used as tools for freedom of expression, rather than command, control, ession, obsession even.

Used to create real-time, responsive music, they can become instruments of attention, not distraction, helping you become present in the place you listen. This is achieved by using the sensors that track the phone's orientation into movements that produce and perform sounds. Now I really am out of my depth, so point you to both Mike and Martin's websites for enlightenment, and to forthcoming

performances. Over to you... good listening!
