
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
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


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







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







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'meanwhile' space is not for ever...

LAST YEAR I wrote an article which appeared in ArtWork 218 in which I reported that Edinburgh Printmaker Spaces (EP Spaces) had opened a studio space in Livingston, West Lothian.

In the article I described what EP Spaces do in general, that is, they find affordable spaces across Scotland for individual artists and groups. I also suggested that the opening of the Livingston venue would be a boost to the creative/artistic environment of West Lothian (something I have a personal interest in, having worked to try to improve this situation for years). The article was of a positive nature in which I praised the ethos of the EP Spaces programme and the work they do.

What I didn't mention at that time is that I was one of the people who moved into the building, the former HMRC office building known as Barbara Ritchie House (above), whose operation moved from Livingston to Edinburgh in 2001.

Now, unfortunately, I have to report that after one year, myself and all the other residents have moved out after being given one month's notice to vacate the building

by October 31. This was always part of the deal and is in the contract, this is what is meant when the building is described as "a meanwhile space".

However, although this is the case, it was always the hope that this would not happen for a while (wishful thinking perhaps)? Even so, I have not changed my opinion of the EP Spaces programme and remain positive, I fully endorse what they are trying to achieve. However, this comes with the caveat that perhaps they are doing too much of the local council's work for them (and this applies to all areas of Scotland).

While EP Spaces do the pioneering work they do, it might just take the pressure off the local authorities to make the effort themselves to provide such facilities for creatives of all kinds – an important aspect of a healthy environment and one which is undervalued.

Having said that, I am glad to have had the opportunity to occupy the studio space. even if only for one year. As well as having a spacious and inexpensive place to work, during the course of that one year my partner and I held two contemporary art exhibitions

and worked on four issues of our free arts magazine (BULB).

Also, with having West Lothian College just across the road, links were made with the college and residents of BRH and, as a result, some of the students held their end of year exhibition in the building. So, suffice to say, it was a valuable resource for the area, especially as a place where creative people are brought together. This is when artist-led projects can be more easily achieved.

A highlight of the year has to be the connections that were made with the two Ukrainian artists Vika and Ira (as discussed in ArtWork 223).

This is not the end, however, as EP Spaces continue to look around the area in order to secure another space for the future. My opinion has not changed since my original article last year, however, my experience of the last year has taught me that it is not advisable to fill the studio with too much

unnecessary stuff: only take what's needed as you can be asked to leave at any time.

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Editorial Comment

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Bring back the audiences!

AFTER COVID it seemed nothing finances for the Festival proper could get worse. Theatres were dark, concert halls lay silent. Audiences had disappeared. But gradually things got better. Lockdown came to an end, Doors were cautiously opened once more and paying customers began to trickle back through them,

Then the lights went out well not exactly out, but wherever possible they were turned down and the heating was turned off.

For households it was bad enough, but for public venues and commercial ventures soaring energy prices have come close to sounding a death knell.

Edinburgh's National Gallery of Modern Art - Modern 2, aka The Dean Gallery - has been put into hibernation. The body behind the Edinburgh Film Festival – and the couple of movie theatres it ran has gone into administration.

In neither case, and certainly not in the latter, has the hike in energy prices been the sole factor, but there is no doubting that it has made a serious situation far worse.

The prospect of getting even a modest sized auditorium or public space up to an acceptable heat can only be described as daunting.

It is heartening that, at the time of writing, it seemed that a rescue operation for the Film Festival was well under way. But

were already looking sorely stretched.

One seemingly lasting result of the public's confinement to barracks over Covid has been a reluctance to venture forth and, while audiences were beginning to come back, the rise and rise of the online experience has definitely had a noticeable effect on numbers.

Across the world, cinema chains -and film makers - are suffering the effects of streaming. Whatever rescue package is put together for the Film Festival it is highly doubtful that it will include a commitment to run a couple of cinemas into the bargain.

Attention also needs to be given to the need to sharpen the experience of audiences across the range of the arts – for film, music and indeed the visual arts.

The effect of actually being there and experiencing things in real time needs to be heightened.

There need to be more opportunities to meet real participants in the flesh: to hear them, to question them, to better understand their message.

We can't – much as we would no doubt love to – get to meet Beethhoven or Bach in the flesh but we can meet contemporary composers, film makers and visual

Let the grass roots flourish!

POSSIBLE CUTS in Arts Council England funding risk leaving patronage to an elite, making culture even less accessible and affordable. Even now the message of West End successes like Jerusalem is diluted when performances don't make it out of London.

Proposals to move English National Opera to Manchester seem unconvincing without parallel investment in regional infrastructure, transport, housing, arts education and the creative economy. The next generation of creatives will suffer...or will they?

Great concert halls, theatres, museums, galleries and libraries embody and preserve some of the best of human creativity from times past, but artforms and materials change with society and technology. In times of trouble, uncertainty, rapid change, social and economic collapse (sound familiar?) it's natural to cling to the known, and to worry when great cultural symbols are threatened. nothing!

Better, though, as Newton said, to see further ahead by standing on the shoulders of giants, than to dismiss the giants as has-beens. We need both for creative souls to look ahead, break new ground, and take artistic expression into new spaces, both real and virtual.

On Tyneside, for example, initiatives like Cobalt Studios and the independent music venue World Headquarters flourish precisely because they are local, lowcost, grass-roots. They reflect their time, place and people. Don't let the establishment get its hands on them! Great creation has an energy and vitality that stops us in our tracks. You never know when that is going to happen. One thing is sure, it's not monetary value that defines great art, it's whether it enhances and celebrates our humanity. Without those qualities, we really are at the mercy of those who know the price of everything but the value of

Just an idea – why not sleep on it?

people to become so rich they can afford to go on such trips. And if not, how rich should we allow them to become? Should anyone be allowed to be rich, whilst so many are becoming dangerously poor?

Why did my lectures fail? Well lack I had assumed that my audiences would be wealthy Americans who had perhaps thought that St Columba had discovered America and instead discovered that over fifty per cent of the passengers were returnees, some had been thirty times.

But my lectures brought some key questions to the fore, to the discomfort of my audiences. I really did blow it. With the Scottish economy in free fall how much should we be supporting the tiny communities in these islands at the expense of the bigger ones on the main

Let me give you a for instance. On one island that I visited there was a primary school with three pupils and seven staff. Meanwhile in Edinburgh folk are having to wait two hours for ambulances.

Many of the islands with populations of fewer than a hundred are absorbing subsidies of over a million a year of tax payers' support, and that's not including investment in capital projects.

If I was lying on a floor with a heart of preparation really. And naughty content. attack waiting for an ambulance I would not be amused at those stats. Or indeed one of the sixty two per cent of Lothian that have said in polls that they are worried that they won't be able to pay their bills this winter.

Personally, I am on the side of the islanders, partly I suppose because I can list seven islands where my forebears have lived, though you will be relieved to hear I'm not going to.


But why? Art darling. Art and community.

The world is looking at the global economic collapse and Cop 27 and wondering what do we do next, and the cringingly crass answers being put forward by both Westminster and Holyrood are simply that we seek further

The real export that we should be evaluating from the islands should not be measured in sheep, cattle or tourist beds provided, but in the fact that in these islands we see folk living satisfying, community led, low carbon footprint lifestyles and it is only if we can learn from them that we, the seething consumption addicted masses on the mainland, have any hope at all.

Of course they in turn have to start accepting that the way to justify their massive subsidies is through taking more responsibility for their role as educators and exemplars, something that the internet is making increasingly practicable.

So that's the kind of stuff I was banging on about on the Hebridean **Princess**, and it didn't go down well at all. Pity. I could do with another trip. Next

Meanwhilespace...

Nick Jones on some radical affordable space concepts

ECO-HOUSING afloat? Remember when Government advice was to share a bath to save water. and a car to commute? Won't be long before official guidelines will be for single people to move in with a stranger. Think how that could solve the housing crisis, halve fuel bills, reduce food waste, even improve Gross National Happiness!

But why stop there, when threesomes, or quartets deliver even greater savings? I'm wondering, you see, how Berwick-upon-Tweed can transform itself into a go-to cultural place to live, work, create and stay afloat in the choppy, rocky cost-of-living-crisis waters where SS Not-So-Great-Britain flounders.

Time for radical thinking about how the nation houses, feeds, heats and employs itself, and to research others' solutions, like Eel Pie Island, in the middle of the Thames at Twickenham; an artists' colony and working boatyard, famed for its hotel hosting rock, pop and jazz musicians including Acker Bilk, Pink Floyd, and the Rolling Stones.

Would a boho quarter work mid-Tweed? Is anyone already creating low cost, eco-housing on the water? Yes! So, next stop, Rotterdam, floating on a Wikkelboat. Real estate being at a premium, and necessity being the mother of invention, this is stylish, short term, energy-efficient visitor accommodation. Construction includes twenty-four layers of corrugated cardboard.

Back in Berwick-upon-Tweed, exciting news! As a Culture and Creative Zone, there's £30M of new public funding to help develop its potential to become even more attractive for living, working, and visiting.

On the cards, a makeover for the historic Barracks, retaining connections with its military past, improving the museum, adding galleries, studios, and residential accommodation. Plus a new Maltings arts centre, designed by RIBA competition, and plans to re-purpose the town centre, converting redundant shops and offices into affordable, energy-efficient accommodation.

In the interim, expect performing arts events popping up in temporary spaces around town. IF all goes to plan, Berwick's "cultural offer" will

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be transformed by 2025, turbo-charging the creative economy, attracting more tourism, and making everyone feel good.

It's a big IF! Long delays and extra costs are par for the course. However wonderful new buildings and facilities. it's the creative energy of people and communities, plus good leadership, that give a place soul.

Meantime, how to build momentum so that, when completed, the town is already buzzing? How, too, to ensure top-down development is synced with grass-roots creativity? Creative people help make Berwick-upon-Tweed such a special place, but they tend to be well established, moving here mid-career.

For arts graduates relocation is more difficult, with limited housing and studio space, a smaller local market for work, and fewer punters than cities. Moreover Berwick, like many English seaside towns, risks being overwhelmed by buy-to-let renters, and second-homers. That has to change, but how, and

More research calls...... Great rivers make their cities and towns special, with natural crossing, meeting, cultural and trading places by the water.

Berwick's historic and economic heritage has always centred around the Tweed and its harbour, for fishing, boatbuilding, rope-making, and granaries. The riverside could be a great asset again. Far better than just a bigger car park! Perfect for studios, workshops, galleries, and popup shops.

So, off to Blue House Yard, Haringey, where "Meanwhilespace" has transformed an underused site for a temporary "meanwhile" mix of uses, strengthening community with a tenant association, urban gardens and events, and good-looking studio and retail space for creatives and designers.

Incomers can see if they like being there, and can make a living. If they do? Sufficient critical mass, nerhans, to be part of a sustainable, long-term scheme, like Dumfries's Midsteeple Quarter, bringing new life into town with affordable accommodation, studios and shops. Grown from an artist-led initiative, it involves community, developers and local authority, integrating cultural, economic and social aims.

Ullapool is another place where the cultural buzz includes teaching, selling and lifestyle attractions, like Bridge House Arts, a small, independent art school; An Talla Solais, a gallery and studios, with artists on the board; and the Ceilidh Place, hosting events for visitors and locals.

Although, as yet Berwick-upon-Tweed has insufficient affordable low-cost eco-housing, and few creative enterprises training and employing young school-leavers to stay, it can take inspiration from initiatives like Artsedex and Assemble.

Artsedex, based in Thanet, provides creative education and alternative employment opportunities, supporting jobs that retain young talent, a catalyst for positive change in their community. Turner Prizewinning Assemble is a multi-disciplinary collective using architecture, design and art to transform places. At Fourth Corner, Liverpool Toxteth, they're working with a non-profit Community Land Trust, holding land for the community, enabling low-cost housing.

Another model, Mutual Home Ownership Societies, brings people together to buy or build otherwise unaffordable homes.

Now I'm looking across the river towards Tweed Dock. There's a mountain of huge logs, from trees felled by Storm Arwen, awaiting shipment to Belgium to be pulped for paper, maybe cardboard too. But wait! Is that an island in the shallows, safe from stormy waters, surrounded by swans, and a colourful array of floating eco-houses, bicycles on cabin roofs, wooden flower-boxes, bunting in the rigging. Or am I dreaming, aboard a Wikkelboat, moored at Eel Pie Island. Listen... not the Rolling Stones, surely?

Pulling strings in the belfry

There's more to bell ringing than might be thought, finds Nick Jones

A DANK, DREICH evening in Berwick-upon-Tweed. A huddle at the side entrance to the Guildhall. Looking up, the clockface glowing through the fog. The keyholder appears out of the mist.

Once in, up three storeys, past the prison cells, a narrow passage, a door and a sign: "When mirth and pleasure is on the wing, we ring. At the departure of a soul, we toll." A small chamber, eight ropes dangling from the ceiling. Thicker, softer, and coloured red, white and blue near the

"Campanology's not for everyone, you know", my guide explains. "Much more than just pulling strings, and this, by the way," holding the coloured section, "this is my old friend sally."

I stand back. Eight ringers stand beside their ropes. Fifty feet above, eight bells, the heaviest weighing a ton. A ninth, the curfew, remains silent. Living six miles from the Guildhall spire, I see its pinnacle, a beacon, a reminder that Berwick-upon-Tweed is my local town, for shopping, culture, friendship.

More important it can be seen by shipping, on a clear day, out in the North Sea. There was no other spire, or bells, until 1754, when the Tolbooth, the municipal heart of Border towns. was rebuilt and renamed the Guildhall.

The Freemen of Berwick have always guarded their independence, knowing that to take sides, be it with church or state, is to be beholden. They knew bells were important, to communicate, control, mourn or rejoice. Lucky for them that Holy Trinity church, completed in 1652, and one of few built during Cromwell's Commonwealth, had no bells. No place for extraneous sounds or merrymaking in those Puritanical, levelling down times. When to ring bells was equally important, given Berwickupon-Tweed's strategic, vulnerable, position on the flakey border with Scotland, open to attack from the sea, at the tricky entrance to the Tweed estuary.

So, for whom did eight bells toll? For navigators, for burghers, for God, Kings, Queens and country. And the curfew? As much about fire prevention as anything else, signalling time

to cover burning coals with ashes, and head bedwards; also, no doubt, to reduce drunkenness, fornication or, worse, sedition!

Rarer uses marked the start of the gleaning season, or the pancake bell, the last chance to get shriven before Lent. Up the tower now, amongst the bells. It's their resonance, imparted by combining 77% tin and 23% copper, that enables a well-made bell to reach parts that others can't, to keep on keeping on for longer - an interesting combination of Heineken and Doppler!

Most foundries are long gone. There's only one left; John Taylor & Co, bell-founding in Loughborough since the 19th Century.

Ringing, each bell comes alive, with its own name and character, inspiring, protecting and connecting. Hence elaborate dedication ceremonies, and admonishing, sometimes enigmatic, inscriptions, like "Love horteth not", "Be not ower bysie." and "I will not fayle to singe mi part according vnto musick art, with my side mates I do agree in perfect shape and harmony" - these from Northants, Lincs and Somerset respectively.

"We're like a big family, working together, looking after each other. Trouble is, we're all getting older, and a family of grandparents doesn't have much future, does it?'

I can't disagree. In past times ringing was more popular than cricket, golf, or football. Bands of "campanarii" roamed the country, the oldest and most venerable being the Ancient Society of College Youths, founded in 1637.

Ringers have their own mathematical, language, abstruse and obscure to the rest of us, like this instruction for Middlesex Bob Triples: "Bobs and singles are the same as Plain Bob. Remember that, after 4ths and back, next is the double dodge 6/7 down." Precisely!

Now they're ringing, I see how important it is for each ringer to concentrate so that the bells peal out, perfectly synchronised. Centuries of skill, determination and dedication have enabled

No bells, no sound; no foundries, no bells; no copper and tin, no bell-metal; no tower, no place to hang; no builders, no tower; no cranes,



no height; no height, no reach; no reach, no call to prayer, arms, mourning, or celebration. No people to listen, no place worth living; for people make place, and place makes people.

Ringing out, the bells create an umbrella of sound, holding the town in their embrace. I notice that three of the slatted louvres allowing the bells to reach all compass points are bricked up, following complaints that they were "too noisy"

with the spirit of place, its genius loci, it risks losing its soul. Artists, writers, poets, musicians and makers understand this; so often it's their interpretations that are inspired by, renew, and keep unique identity alive.

Without hands-on communication like bell-ringing, linked to a particular place in time, you get an ubiquitous, amorphous, "could be anywhere, anytime" culture, one that global social media thrives on.

Increasingly, everywhere looks the same. Increasingly, people feel disconnected. Time to mute the phone and listen to those bells; sounds like they have

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ST ANDREW BLACKADDER

A remarkable multi-talent on display at Glasgow's Pollok House

Mary Gladstone is much taken by the work of the Scottish-Ghanaian poet and artist, Maud Sulter

PEOPLE BANG ON about Glasgow's Burrell, but its fine art collection is nothing compared to the Spanish Masters and other paintings hanging in Pollok House farther down the road.

Back in the mid-18th century, the Stirling Maxwells got William Adam to design their Georgian pile and a century later the incumbent patriarch, snapped up fabulous paintings by El Greco, Murillo, Goya, Rubens and William Blake.

The house is now run by National Trust for Scotland. Recently NTS, on discovering that more than half its properties (40 in all) have connections with slavery, has wanted to know more about how its fine old houses were built and financed and has set up a project, 'Facing our Past', to find out.

Shortly, a 'creative practitioner' will look into how the Stirling Maxwells of Pollok House gained wealth through slavery and will write about it for visitors to read.

Since 2017, NTS has held exhibitions at the house. Earlier this year, they showed artistphotographer, E.A. Hornel's work, emphasising his Glasgow connections. So, it's appropriate that the present show (October 15 - December 4 and January 6 - 15, 2023) whose opening coincided with Black History Month Scotland, highlights Scottish- Ghanaian poet and artist, Maud Sulter (1960-2008)

Sulter packed a lot into her 47 years. Born to a Scottish mother and Ghanaian father, she spent her childhood in Glasgow. She emerged during the British Black Arts Movement of the 80s. Her notable work is a book of poetry 'As a Black Woman' (1985). The poem of the same name won her the Vera Bell prize from the Afro-Caribbean Education Resource. Having studied photography at university, Sulter continued to work with the visual image, mainly in photography but also in film, installation, collage, photomontage, sound and performance.

Sulter's work has appeared internationally and in Britain. The V & A (1987) The Johannesburg Biennale (1995) and the Scottish National Portrait

Gallery (2003).

She received awards from British Telecom New Contemporaries (1990) and the Momart Fellowship at the Tate, Liverpool (1990). Not content with that,



she founded her own publishing company (Urban Fox Press), collaborated with contemporary women artists and writers, curated shows, edited anthologies. wrote a play about Jerry Rawlings, ex-president of Ghana and lectured in fine art at Manchester Metropolitan University. She did all of that as a mother of three children!

Comprising three rooms on the 2nd floor, Pollok House's new gallery isn't exactly prepossessing. The lift (broken when ArtWork's reporter visited), only reaches the first floor anyway

Far from the Spanish Masters downstairs, but not quite relegated to the servants' quarters, the exhibition space seems to emphasise traditional class division. Along with photography, which dominates,

the show features an archival display of Sulter's poetry, solo and group exhibitions catalogues, press releases, brochures, artist's books, leaflets and invitation cards.

Although Sulter is remembered for bringing black women out of the shadows and giving them a voice, she was also interested in her Scottish roots. 'Twa Blak Wimmin' (1997), a photographic print, recognises the historical connection between Europe and Africa as the title refers to old Scots and black women in Scottish history.

Sulter's 2002 collage, 'Scots w' Afro', is a fascinating mixture of Scots and African, depicting on newsprint, an African-looking Scot in tartan, playing the bagpipes. Sulter's maternal grandfather was an amateur photographer who instilled a love of the medium, particularly portraiture.


Perhaps her 1989 large-scale photographic series, 'Zabat', is her most resounding polemic. She re-imagines the traditional muses as black. Critical of the absence of black women in European art, she 'puts them back in the centre of the frame'. Each sitter, a contemporary artist, performer or writer, as an allegorical figure, offers their particular attribute as a prop to denote their identity.


For example, Alice Walker, the African-American Pulitzer Prize winning author of 'The Color Purple', is Clio who, as the muse of comedy and bringer of flowers, carries flowers.

Another muse, Terpsichore holds a lump of fool's gold, an allusion to colonialism and slavery and wears a white wig, a potent symbol of white power.

The artist's own self-portrait is Calliope, muse of epic poetry where she adopts the guise of actor and dancer, Jeanne Duval, Haitian muse of the poet Charles Baudelaire.

Sulter was fascinated by Duval, particularly





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by her mid-19th century photograph, entitled 'An Unknown Woman', which encouraged the artist to give the dancer a name.

Sulter sees photography as a tool and not a weapon. Through parody and subversion she identifies our white, male-dominated, Eurocentric cultural tradition. Employing the smooth lines and decorous elements of neo-classical painting, and placing her model, a black woman, in an entitled white pose, she overturns the conventions of 18th century portraiture.

With a series of black, white and colour photographs of eight portraits, 'Hysteria' (1990), was created during Sulter's Momart residency at the Tate, photographs. These Liverpool. The artist's subject is a 19th century black

woman sculptor who sailed from the US to Europe to make her fortune but her career ended in obscurity.

The central character is modelled by Sulter. Another is represented by novelist, Barnardine Evaristo who, in 2019, was the first black woman to win the Booker Prize with 'Girl, Woman, Other'. Yet another reminds the viewer of 18th century Allan Ramsay's portrait of the wife of Daniel Conyngham, a plantation-owner in the British West Indies.

Generous space is allocated for 'Memories of Childhood', original Sulter family snapshots, enlarged and transformed

into exhibition demonstrate Sulter's recollections of growing up as a black child in Scotland during the 60s.

As with much of her work, Sulter displays text and image in tandem. A volume of her poetry of the same name is also exhibited. As Sulter is regarded by many as one of Scotland's most outstanding artists, this exhibition is an excellent choice.

Although, somewhat arcane for visitors unfamiliar with British contemporary art, for the enthusiast, it is a thoughtprovoking and delightful show.
