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Taking a stand on standing stones Nick Jones meets a couple of modern day stone

inscribers leaving their mark on history

I'M WITH IAN and Sue, a couple of time travellers living in deepest Northumberland. Ian, a skilled silversmith and jeweller, had a workshop on The Hirsel estate, outside Coldstream. An interest in how metal was worked in the past led to metal-detecting, and the discovery of the Abbey St Bathans Hoard, remark-

able Roman bronzes, in the southern Lammermuirs. He was also drawn to the old stone structures

and standing stones, like nearby Edin's Hall Broch, dating back to around 500BC. Now, trading as Glyphz, Ian and Sue are rediscovering the power of stone and metal as transformative media, inspired by paleolithic rock art and Pictish designs.

Far from retreating from the complications and challenges of the modern world, they've recognised the need to rediscover and recognise their relevance and value today. Their artwork is formed of linear designs incised into a rough textured stone that seems to have chosen them, not vice versa. Designs, inlaid with burnished copper, that embody the clarity and power of simplicity.

Going back a further 20,000 years or so, their carvings of bison are inspired by prehistoric cave paintings such those at Lascaux in the Dordogne depicting the co-dependence of humans and wild creatures that provided food, clothing, shelter and simple tools. These images suggest a deep respect, awe, reverence even, for fellow creatures.

The mysteries of the caves inspired writer Jean Marie Auel's Land of Painted Caves, and film-maker Werner Herzog's Cave of Forgotten Dreams. Fast forward to Pictland in the post-Roman, pre-Norman period, in what is now Scotland. Little is known about the Picts, one of several groups including Celts, Britons, Gaels, Norse, and Northumbrian Angles, all jockeying for power and land. They left no written records, so we have no idea about their language, or lack of it.

What we do have are a handful of linear relief carvings in stone, like those at Aberlemno, near Brechin in Angus. They feature archetypal symbols, abstract designs, spirals, whorls, knotwork, serpents, enigmatic z-rods and double discs, unique to Pictish

designs, along with humans and both domestic and hunted animals including bulls, horses and deer.

Highland life in the early medieval period was not so different from neolithic times. Survival depended

on living in harmony with nature and respecting, not exploiting it, be it animal, vegetable or mineral, because all

creation was considered sacred, with spirit and soul embodied in all matter. Similar images of geometric symbols, humans and animals are found in the paintings and carvings of many indigenous cultures. Wood and bone could be cut and shaped, but stone and metal were longer-lasting. Human invention and skill could transform all into shelter, clothing and food. Stone carvings express the creative spirit, depicting victories in battle, enigmatic symbols, and strange mythic creatures.

As the influence of the Celtic Church spread from Ireland, with Columba reaching Iona in 563AD, the concept of a supreme, external deity began to be incorporated into Pictish carvings. They retained their geometric symbols, but embraced and accepted the new religion and its iconography with a "Both/And" attitude to change. The natives of west Cumbria demonstrated the same enlightened tolerance in the 10th century Gosforth Cross, which depicts the enchaining of Loki from Norse mythology on one face and the crucifixion of Christ on the other.

Irrelevant to humanity's predicament today? Perhaps not. Our survival as a species is not a given. In the best selling French graphic book World Without End French scientist and writer Jean-Marc Jancovici and illustrator Christophe Blain confront this Faustian moment, implying that we've had the pleasure, enjoying, squandering, and wasting the planet's

resources. Now's the time to pay, feel the pain, and change the way we treat not just each other, but the rest of creation.

It's no longer meaningful to think in terms of "Either/Or", you or me, them or us. That way lies the ego-driven exploitation of people and planet by a small, powerful, wealthy minority that has got us into this mess, and continues to produce a hugely disproportionate carbon footprint. Time to learn from our forebears that "Both/And" is a better option. All being interconnected we're not the only ones that matter. As self- styled philosophical entertainer Alan Watts put it "There is no separate "you" to get something out of the universe, as if life were a bank to be robbed. For "you" is the universe looking at itself from billions of points of view."

I wonder if Ian and Sue are actually in the vanguard of positive change in the way we relate to and see ourselves as part of the "known" world. Known in inverted commas because there is so much knowledge that we have lost from the past, and so much that we have yet to find. Their next project? Carved standing stones, recreated for modern times, recog-

nising their spellbinding power to centre, heal and calm. Lost wisdom, rediscovered.

Whose content is it, really?

SOMEWHAT LATE in the day, but, it is to be hoped, not too late, concern about the activities of the artificial intelligence industry is finding expression across the creative community.

Writers, musicians and publishers have realised that - yet again – Big Tech is taking us for a ride. Perhaps this time their protests of innocence will be taken more cynically.

When the internet was in its infancy Big Tech got away with murder – almost literally – by protesting that they were merely acting as conduits for the material - often as we now realise very damaging material - that users put out.

While conventional publishers must take responsibility for everything they put out, Big Tech would have none of it. Their specious claim to be defending 'free speech' has proved sufficient cover for them to hide behind and escape any responsiblity for what has turned out all too often to be very damaging.

The advertising revenue they have 'stolen" from more conventional media has proved to be highy detrimental to many media enterprises, particularly newspapers.

With the raids they have made on the creative community 'stealing' content from writers, composers and artists to 'train' their creations - they have done and are doing immense damage to copyrighted material.

A number of lawsuits are now in train. Might it be possible to mount one enormous class action with the muscle to counter the mega power of Big Tech and their legal friends?

The storage of, especially creative, material in a digital age is of further concern. As these columns never tire of painting out, 'the Cloud' is not some cuddly, fluffy concept up there in the heavens, but an earth-based industry consuming vast amounts of energy and holding enormous amounts of valuable intellectual property in often dubious circumstances.

Have we finally got the measure of these self-styled 'public benefactors'? Maybe.

All hands to the (oil) pump?

ONE SMALL chink of sanity has appeared in Holyrood's climate change thinking: wood burning stoves will no longer be banned from installation in new buildings.

A small step in the right direction? It remains to be seen whether the election of a rabid climate change denier to the White House will bring any further signs of policy moderation.

Mr Trump has made it plain that he will encourage America's oil producers to pump, pump, pump as much of the black stuff as they can.

So Britain's virtual withdrawal from the North Sea will be made to seem still more precipitous and self-damaging.

This is not to suggest that Trump has got it right in any sense, but what it will do is underline the perils of the rush into a very poorly thought through global warming reduction policy.

Wildly unrealistic promises of a "jobs bonanxa" from a lurch into renewables will be shown up still more starkly by the American 'elephant's' presence in the room.

There are other objections raised by the NO campaign. House prices would be pushed up beyond the means of local people. For decades, there has been a steady exodus of young people and families from the villages and towns, with the closing of schools, shops and post offices. Houses lie empty for most of the year, only to be used as second homes or holiday lets.

If the Lake District is anything to go by (and it is, of course, one of the UK's famed national parks), I shudder at the thought of my neck of the woods receiving a similar designation. Down there among Beatrix Potter's old haunts, everything is sign-posted and prescribed: double yellow lines painted along the roads whose verges are dotted with lamp-posts.

It's unrecognisable from Wordsworth's era with his pristine daffodils.

As for Robert Burns, who knew Galloway and lived all his short life in its next-door counties, his world of 'tim'rous mice' and dancing witches is as alien to us here as the dinosaur period.

Do we really need the undemocratically appointed status of a national park? Are we to be shoved, like First Nation indigenous people, into a reservation, fenced-off in a ghetto of 'let's-pretend-we're-authentically-rural' when it's patently obvious that we no longer are?

The YES campaign say that our new status would 'put Galloway on the map', give us pride in our area and serve as a beacon for a greener Scotland.

Who are they kidding? Will becoming a national park help with the steady degradation of the land, its plants and animals? Old Scots pines ravaged by gales, hedgerows decimated, cows no longer grazing in fields but shut up in byres 24/7, roadsides strewn with the corpses of foxes, hares, rabbits, deer, badgers, pheasants and hedgehogs (if there are any left to run over).

As for the Scottish Government's laws on bird protection, it hasn't begun to solve the urgent problem of droves of crows assaulting gardens and fields, the sight of which is reminiscent of the climax to a Hitchcock movie.

So, leave Galloway alone.

Keep it forgotten, slightly moribund and off the map, please.

Back in Time to the 20s Cathy Bell looks at a productive period in Scottish art A POINT IN TIME is a section of a survey of Scottish ism, a movement originating in Italy. Unfortunately, the dynamism does not come across so it does not make for art from 1800-1945 being exhibited in the National Galleries on the Mound in Edinburgh. This sub-section

a satisfactory image as it is neither one thing or another. This is not a criticism but rather an observation that the artist clearly had the desire to follow a new trend in painting.

More successful perhaps in terms of capturing the intended Vorticist style is a painting by William McCance Portrait of Joseph Brewer (1925) McCance has portrayed his sitter in the manner of a machine. It packs a punch even today. The figure is seated reading a book, the book has no text, the pages merely radiating a futuristic metallic surface. As mentioned previously, The Yellow Glove by William Cowie is a well-known painting. It shows the artist's wife seated dressed in the height of fashion with cigarette holder, red lipstick and, of course, the vellow glove. Interestingly this is a quite different image from Cowie's other piece in the exhibition A Portrait Group (1933) which captures the sense of a moment in time with two teenage boys, a teenage girl and an older woman seated outdoors around a table.

The mood and atmosphere of both paintings are quite different. Whereas the portrait of Cowie's wife (although fashion wise firmly in the period) has a sense of immediacy as if belonging to the "now", the sitter might open her mouth and speak. In the group portrait, however, possibly partly due to the muted colours as well as the fashions of the past depicted in detail, the jackets of the boys, the lady's blouse, the blue jacket over her arm even the tablecloth there is a sense of another time. The background is like a dream taking the viewer back to a simpler time, a time tucked between two world wars, a nostalgic vision and because of that, an enchanting picture.

It is apparent in this exhibition how artists were experimenting with different styles of expression. For example, compare JD Ferguson's portrayal of his muse Margaret Morris, In the Patio; Margaret Morris (1925) with the sculpture head in brass Eastre (Hymn to the Sun) (1924 cast in 1971). The former is gentle almost renaissance in feel, but still modernist. Whereas the sculpture has a metallic hardness and brilliance


of colour which differs significantly from the painting which is fairly low-key. And the comparisons go on. Anne Redpath has two still lives in the exhibition.

The Indian Rug or Red Slippers (1942) is Fauvist in style while the other which is fairly traditional is a world away from the almost garish (by comparison) red chair and slippers. Compare this again with Still Life # 1 by Samuel Peploe (1913) Peploe seems to have thrown everything but the kitchen sink at it in an attempt to make a cubist image, however, the bold lines and colour are not aesthetically harmonious.

Among the delights of this exhibition, the title piece A Point in Time by William Johnston (1929) is a highlight. This large abstract work reveals that a Scottish artist was at the forefront of the modern art movement. This was early for abstraction, which had only really appeared several years earlier. Wassily Kandinsky was a pioneer in this entirely new way of expression, his first abstract paintings date from only several years before.

A painting by Ben Nicholson, Chelsea (1924) has been cited as the first British abstract painting. Therefore, the evidence suggests that a Scottish artist was at the forefront in the perception changing emergence of abstract art.

Illuminating gaffer Kirsty

THE LAW FAMILY are not only artistic, but they're mad about boats. That's been the case since 1997 when they bought Kirsty, a sailing yacht or, to be more precise, a Loch Fyne skiff. For landlubbers, it seems odd but impressive that Pat and Andy, with daughters Mhairi and Kirsty, would work for months, even years, sprucing up a boat and when they had the time, investigate the history of their 100 year old vessel.

To celebrate the boat's centenary The Scottish Maritime Museum has put on a multi-media show. Gaffer: Impressions from a Loch Fyne Skiff at the Linthouse on Irvine Harbourside until February 2 next year. The term 'gaffer', does not only refer to 'a boss', but also a boat ('old gaffer') with a gaff sailing rig.

Of interest to the maritime historian as it is one of the few surviving Loch Fyne skiffs, Kirsty is registered with National Historic Ships UK. She is a 37 feet gaff-rigged ketch sailing yacht of

carved pitch pine on oak frames. Her design follows the line of a Loch Fyne skiff, used for ringnet fishing across the west coast of Scotland in the late nineteenth century. She was built in 1921 as a family cruiser for David Mowat, manager of Summerlee Iron Works, Coatbridge by John Fyfe

of Ardmaleish boatyard on the isle of Bute The Fyfes of Bute were

related to the Fife yacht-building

family of Fairlie, who were among the first builders of Loch Fyne skiffs. Until they tried their hand at yacht construction with Kirsty, they built fishing skiffs and cargo boats.

The Laws have woven together a narrative on their boat, using photographs, old and new, paintsome original objects still exist, like varnished wooden blocks through which the sail is hoisted. Additionally, a beautifully-crafted bronze boat-hook head and shackle, built for a practical purpose but, in their simplicity and integrity, are objects of beauty in themselves.

For the past 25 years, since they have owned **Kirsty**, the Law's research into her history has been punctilious. To uncover her story they have explored beyond the log books, photographs, letters, bills of sale, newspaper cuttings and documents like her old registration records, contacted anyone with a connection to her and visited Ardmaleish where she was built.

For the present show, it was easy to gather material. They knew every inch of Kirsty, had amassed a mass of memorabilia, so the challenge was to pare it down to a manageable size.

Lead artist, Pat practises a range of art forms, from drawing, painting, film and installation, often in collaboration with other artists. She has exhibited in galleries, outdoor venues across Scotland and other countries. She has worked in the Arctic Circle, sailed around the coast of Svalbard and held an exhibition in a disused herring factory in Iceland.

Her abstract canvases, covered with peat and salt,

two substances representing land and sea on the west coast, are a response to her relationship with Kirsty, on which they burned peat in

travelled to the Faroe Islands and Patagonia in Chile to complete her projects. Within this show is a short film in which Kirsty Law reads letters written in 1986 to Peter and Fran Flutter, owners of the boat before the Laws bought her, by the elderly Jean Hunter (né e Fyfe), describing her pleasure in watching Kirsty being built and sailing in her with the Mowats. With these



Kirsty Law contributes her sound recordings and a poem in her own words and voice. As a Scots song-writer and singer, versed in the Scottish and Irish tradition, she composes music, reviewed by BBC Radio 3 as 'spellbinding'. Last, but not least, is Andy, a vital, technical producer, wood-sawing expert and dab hand at liaison.

This multi-media show about a remarkable old boat imparts an important message. Although traditional boat-building is a specific skill threatened with extinction, it can be saved. The revival and care of these boats aren't purely an act of nostalgia and the preservation of the old for their own sake, but about revitalising communities and bringing people together to learn old skills. The construction and maintenance of boats, are as much a part of the land as the sea. Boats help to shape communities, especially the islands which still rely on them as

they have touched the lives of people for centuries.

It's all in the family down in Wooler

The Northumberland Connections of the mixed media exhibition on at Gallery@ No 6 in Wooler are mainly family ones – the extended one of ArtWork writer Nick Jones amd his wife Ana

IS TALENT inheritable? Cesare Lombroso thought perhaps. In the Man of Genius, he cites Francis Galton, the founder of British eugenics, who calculated a ratio of 250 geniuses to every million in a population. He considers the phenomenon of the Bach family. Aristophanes' two comedic sons. Dumas pere and fils. Yet other examples make the contrary case. Rembrandt's son Titus abandoned painting. Walter

Scott's son boasted he'd never opened a book, and Mozart's offspring claimed the tinkling of money was the only music he enjoyed. Artistic talent is inherited, Lombroso concludes, except when it isn't.

A student of the question would do well to visit Northumbrian Connections at Gallery @ No 6 in Wooler, or go to the website after it closes on November 16. The seven exhibitors are three generations of the

one family, the family in question is the Joneses with extended branches and alliances

The organising factor is Nick Jones, (a contributor to this very paper) who categorises his clan into "young ones", "the middle", and "the ancients". He is one of the ancients, along with his wife, Ana Balfour

and sister Meredith Ramsbotham. Nick and Ana's two children, Harvest Rose and Kittie, make up the middle, with the youth being Harvest Rose's children, Rowan and Poppy.

I have known the family for over two decades and first visited the Watermill exactly twenty years ago. The Watermill was a kind of Jones gesamtkunstwerk, a beacon of warm pink and brilliant blue blazing against the dun and green

of rural Cumbria. Churning at its centre was one of the few working watermills left in the UK, and around about swirled a Jonescapade of bread-baking, artmaking, wordsmithing, type-printing, goat-milking, food-fabrication, and so on and so much more. The Watermill has since been passed into other hands, but the family's activities have not ceased, as the Wooler show shows.

The youngest represented is Poppy Harris-Jones who has just left school and paints a reclining cat against long planes of milky blue. The feline is fluffy, languorous and faintly sullen. Very catlike. Her brother, Rowan, is a cheerful railway zealot and has learned the craft of photography to record choice trains. His photographs zoom up to a breath away from their subject – a fish-gobbling puffin, a sprinting hare, and their motion is captured with incredible crispness.

Their mother, Harvest Rose, shows densely coloured felts, like slabs of gemstone into which, somehow, has seeped the image of a bird

You might be familiar with Kittie's seascapes, her monotypes of fanged rock, raucous with birdlife. She is well known as an artist in Scotland. She rolls ink in great crags of colour, mixed, always, to a shade slightly beyond the expected. Her work in the show has an uncharacteristically limited palette: tumbling perspectives of rain-dark cliff and expanses of glorious green-gold.

Kittie's aunt, Meredith Ramsbotham, also shows shorelines, though of a very different variety. These are vast sweeps of sea, smooth against flat sand, seen from odd high angles. There are interiors too, windows, oblique along corridors, whose panes are hazy and opaque. Her palette is chalky white, salmon and grey.

Compare with Nick's quayside scenes and windowside ledges. These pictures brim with boats or odd containers, an elegant spindly line loops over the white page, circling areas washed in summery blue or raspberry.

And finally, Ana – her clothes are a joy. Woollen-ware, coiled like pots. What if they were the national dress for a whole civilization? They would be a rugged people, possibly living in burrows like Skara Brae or the Shire, and their homes would be banded with dusky pink.


tangerine and brilliant azure. They would be obsessed with colour, they would be very snug, and very happy.

But what does it all tell us about that question then? Does talent run in the blood? You can certainly track resemblances between the artists in the show. Waterfronts, birds, a sensitivity to colour, an affinity to particular forms. Though it is as possible that certain families sprout artists because they cultivate their children in the right conditions (aka the Watermill), they are exposed to culture and nourished with encouragement. Yet that approach too is mysterious. As Lombroso shows us, as hard as he tries, there is no predicting how humans cast off into the world.

Most beguiling about a show like Northumbrian Connections, is the opportunity to chase connections, a fleeting resemblance, like a smile or a frown that flickers through a family, through a great assort-ment of facial features, and, often, employed for very



distinct moods and in different circumstances, and yet emerges as unself-conscious and as natural to those within that family as to be invisible. At Gallery@No.6, 6 High Street,



PAI, Paisley Art Institute: artists Joe Hargan, Eslvn Barr and Marie Louise defied bureaucracy. relocating the 150 year old PAI from Paisley to Glasgow Art Club, a move to revitalise both organisations. Helping create new vibe and new menu is restrauteur Gordon Yuill, while Hargan has created their new display of distinguished Scottish paintings, including works from PAI.

EXCITING & UNIQUE. THE REVELATOR,

the world's only arts venue located in a home-made circular wall of death, is jam packed with ideas, artists, inspiration and exhibitions.

VIDEO. Smith/Stewart collaborators since the 1990s, make the most memorable videos I know. They teach at Glasgow Art School where their exhibition Present Tense included installation and early videos.

My GOOD NEWS is that my Clare Henry Archive, from 1978 to today, is going to the Scottish National Galleries.

Failures/Tragedies:

MACKINTOSH: Glasgow was famous for its iconic Mackintosh buildings. After 2 fires, the GSA lies under a white shroud with no sign of progress. Mismanagement forced GSA into arbitration re insurance. Mackintosh's neglected Martyrs School is also up for sale.

WASPS, with 22 buildings across Scotland containing thousands of artists have doubled rents of many of their studios. Disaster for many. CLARE HENRY clrhenry@aol.com





FINANCIAL HELP FOR SCOTTISH ARTISTS

Maxwell Macleod's Cauld Blast

EVEN THOUGH she specifically asked for no large obituary, I think it is right to note the death at 69 of Prof Stana Nenerdic. This extraordinary woman, having initially worked as dresser to both Nureyev and Fonteyn, then went on to become the first female professor of history in Scotland and whose death has yet to be reported in the media.

Born to an Eastern European father and a Yorkshire mother, she ran away from home to work as a dresser in various theatres. She described Fonteyn as a darling and Nureyev as a monster.

Naturally bright and an obsessive reader, she studied both literature and art before ending up as a lecturer and then professor of history at Edinburgh.

On a personal level she was no typical academic, being invariably cheerful and positive, and only days before her death was hungry for news of both politics and vibrant life in general. This was an artist whose positivity enabled her to jump from theatre into a senior role in the world of academe. AND THEN there's the death of Toby Robinson. The boat building community of the Gaelic world, and thousands of others, are shocked at the news of the death at fifty five of Toby Robinson, who was instrumental in the famous project to restore the burnt-out hulk of a Danish fishing boat in the remotest boatyard in Britain, a beach site over twenty miles from a main road at Doune in Knoydart.

They had achieved this through using the insurance money they had gained after her accidental burning not as suggested by the insurers to sink her wreck, but to build a hostel to house volunteers to come to the wilderness to rebuild her into the lovely Eda Francen, a charter boat for tourists that still does good business. It was a phenomenal project that inspired others facing difficult challenges.

Toby then became a legend, building a floating caravan which he used to travel the isles restoring remote houses and creating a wilderness home for his autistic son (see a recent article of mine in the Herald).

A stone to his cairn.

THEN. OF COURSE. there is the impending death of the Church of Scotland. The figures are extraordinary. Fifty per cent of the congregations gone in the last ten years; average age of those left

attending sixty two. Do the Math. At this rate the Kirk will be all but dead in twenty odd years.

This will release hundreds of church buildings onto the property market leading to the dilemma of who should control them - the bean counters in the Kirk or the local communities who had often financed their construction.

Local planners will also have a role in deciding what should be allowed. Should they be museums to christianity, community centres. or holiday homes for lairds?

Tom Morton, the renowned social activist in Shetland, is firmly of the opinion that more of these churches should be community centres. So evidently are the people on the Hebridean Island of Eigg who are half way through an initial fundraising campaign to buy their largely unused church.

This could be a critical time for the establishment of art centres in Scotland and should surely be noted and engaged with.


FINALLY, there is the worrying possibility of the death of Summerhall, Europe's biggest privately owned art centre located in the middle of Edinburgh. I wouldn't dream of disentangling the mess of interests in this wonderfully successful venue other than to thank its director, Robert Macdowell, for his tireless work for the venture and to wish him well as he struggles to retain it.

Personally I am drawn to the notion of selling off the ghastly tower block that dominates the complex and recycling the cash, perhaps to refurbish the fifteen rooms that have been used by the legendary Richard Demarco, who, at 94, is having to possibly seek other premises for the archive.

At all events, every effort must be made to savewhat is now a national - no international cultural treasure by

the relevant public bodies. And so should we all. ∎i£®
