

### **Borderline cases:**

#### Nick Jones takes the cultural temperature in a not-too-rapidly-changing Berwick-upon-Tweed

BACK IN MAY, Berwick-upon-Tweed was named the pop-ups. Or take a leaf out of the Edinburgh Fringe book over nearly two centuries. My favourites? Extended happiest place to live by the Guardian. I'm with some visitors, who'd hoped to see a show at the Maltings arts centre. Shut, it's being demolished, ahead of a £25M+ redevelopment. The design has divided the town. On my headphones, Peter Sellers' skit, "We Need The Money".

The strap-cash-strapped Earl of Prong, challenged to keep his family and their ancestral seat. Bedside Manor, in the money, has hit on the idea of giving visitors the opportunity to pay to spend all day drinking tea and watching a building being built, demolished, built, demolished...ad infinitum.

Plans for the new Maltings have the green light, but not everyone's happy, particularly Berwick Heritage, an independent group committed to preserving the town's historic heritage. They describe them as "unsympathetic, bland, soulless, utterly devastating", and worse.

Meanwhile Create Berwick, tasked with kickstarting cultural regeneration, wants the town to become "one of the most distinctive, must-see cultural destinations in the country, investing in arts, creativity and culture." Get it right, think Sydney Opera House or Guggenheim Bilbao, and distinctions between art, sculpture and architecture dissolve, attracting tourists and cash in bucketfuls.

It's not clear how long the Maltings rebuild will take, or the final cost. Maybe, whilst we're waiting, there's a Bedside Manor style performance art opportunity here, complete with happenings, installations, and

and develop temporary spaces.

All summer, visitors have flocked in, full of expectation of cultural and historic delights ahead. blissfully unaware that when a storm blew through last winter it wasn't just the slates of W H Smith that slid onto Marygate, or the beautiful glass dome over Slightly Foxed bookshop in Bridge Street that was shattered (now, thankfully, restored).

This storm heralded more fundamental changes. The Barracks houses Berwick Museum & Art Gallery and the KOSB Regimental Museum; both closed for redevelopment. More frustrated visitors ask what's going on. I speak of jam tomorrow, a future promising improved exhibition, gallery, and archives, along with studios for artists and makers. All good reasons to return in years to come!

Elsewhere, private enterprise, sensing opportunity, has stepped into the breach. Culture-vultures won't be disappointed. W H Smith may have gone, but The Book Loft has opened nearby, selling new books. Another newcomer, Bastion Books, in Church Street, specialises in second hand military, adventure and expedition books. Turn down West Street and you'll find Abstract, a new art gallery showing a wide range of contemporary work by artists and makers.

Performance art is also alive and kicking, thanks to Tortive Theatre's small, informal space, Straw Yard, nestling inside the town's walls near the Barracks. And film? Maltings Cinema is temporarily relocated at the Mob Store. Hard to find, but comfortable once you get there. Meanwhile another string to Maltings' bow, Granary Gallery, remains unchanged. The Light of Days Past: Photography in Berwick 1840-1980 includes portraits, townscapes, and news stories, cataloguing changes in fashion, style, and technological advances

landscape format prints of Berwick Old Bridge and the Royal Border Bridge from 1908, including one of The Flying Scotsman.

Although easier to ask the question, "where does recording end and artistry begin?" than to answer it, I'd recommend heading for Foldyard Gallery in Bridge Street on leaving the Granary, to see Dave Watson's photography, influenced by Fay Godwin, John Blakemore, and Raymond Moore; all masters of traditional, pre-digital camera-work. Dave has set up his own darkroom, relearning old skills, and teaching them. Also at Foldyard, in complete contrast, Morag Eaton's prints, inspired by Carl Jung's "Symbols of Transformation", bridges between the conscious and unconscious mind.

Good news too, across the Old Bridge in Tweedmouth, just up from Dockside Gallery. Here Berwick Community Trust is well on with plans to convert the Old Brewery into eight artist spaces, a teaching/skill sharing space, community resource and a gallery. It's scheduled to open in 2026, with a relatively modest price tag of around £ 1M. I don't have the stats, but my experience with Berwick Creative Guild, set up in 2019 to bring artists and creatives together to share work. resources and projects, was that this town buzzed with creativity. It still does. The new Brewery will surely take it up a gear, providing that the ensuing regeneration doesn't price the creative young out of the housing Beware geese laying golden eggs! market...


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### **Editorial Comment**

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#### The BBC deserves our thanks

IT WAS NOT a particularly edifying scene, but the BBC big game hunters got a couple growing popularity of the of scalps relatively easily after the Daily Telegraph was joined by the Daily Mail and Borid Johnson(!) in the chase.

One is bound to wonder, however, if the departure of the Director General and his head of news will satisfy the baying hounds.

The ham fisted doctoring of a Trump speech to give a mistaken impression of outright support for the Capitol rioters was as stupid as it was needless. While the President was smart enough to avoid overt support for the rioters, careful research would easily have shown a total lack of outright condemnation.

In a rapidly changing media landscape, bodies like the BBC – if there actually are any - face an increasingly impossible task maintaining 'impartiality' in the face of competition from a social media environment which has no obligation to attempt this

difficult task.

To some extent the podcast does allow the army of very talented staff the BBC employs some leeway to express a limited spectrum of opinions,

In tairly and accurately reporting the Gaza situation the BBC faces an even more impossible task. The state of Israel employs one of the most sophisticated news management systems of any regime in the world.

In addition, as is well known, it prevents any proper first hand reporting from the besieged territory, allowing only very occasional. rigidly controlled effectively 'propaganda' visits under army supervision.

In the circumstances, BBC journalists have done, and continue to do, a sterling job trying to get to the truth.

Rather than subjecting them to endless politically inspired sniping, we should offer them a big thank you.

### Speak up for copyright

THE BATTLE for some sort of justice in the war which threatens copyrught holders throughout the world does not based creators seem most get any easier.

Getty Images, a major world wide holder of photographic images, recently lost a copyright claim against a UK based artificial intelligance firm that, it was claimed, had 'scraped' content from its enormous image

Throughout the world, creators of artistic, literary and visual content are seeing their work literally being 'stolen' by Big – and smaller – Tech to further boost the enormous profits they stand to make from exploiting their work.

The notion of copyright protection was designed to allow the creators of artistic and intellectual material some security in an often precarious battle for survival.

It is a battle in which UK unlikely to get much support from their government.

So desperate does the UK government seem to be to offer a welcome to Big Tech in all its forms that they are prepared to sacrifice the very important contribution the arts make through the projection of soft power throughout the world.

Writers, artists, musicians - and their audiences - must fight back.

Not only through the law courts, but in the whole public arena of the arts we must state the case, loud and clear.

The damage that is already being done can, if allowed to go unchecked, turn out to be catastrophic.

Time to speak out!

### Old None's Almanack\*

#### ArtWork's Jick Nones, consulting his crystal ball, looks into the future and predicts turbulent times ahead for the arts

December 2025. Following disastrous economic forecasts for the UK in 2026 the Government, its hand forced by the Treasury. has appointed the independent think-tank, Artless, to advise on future policy.

January 2026. Cabinet ministers, spotted caving in Yorkshire and climbing in Cumbria, confirm that they are practising how to get out of a tight spot, between a rock and a hard place.

Following the success of its "Pink Ball" fundraiser, which raised £ 2.5M, The British Museum announces The Rainbow Project, a series of monthly coloured balls. Tate Britain, equally desperate for funds, reveals that it is to become a boutique hotel, offering a chance to sleep with iconic masterpieces. The National Gallery, in association with the Louvre, promotes "Break-in Experiences".

February. The Culture Minister announces the abolition of the Arts Council, and the British Council, due to financial pressures. In Cornwall, a group of the UK's wealthiest writers, musicians, artists, actors and film-makers are spotted. A reporter is told they are doppelgangers, look-alikes for a block-buster film. Some Cabinet Ministers are also seen nearby.

March. In a surprise announcement the Government calls a snap election at the end of April. The CEO of Artless, Artemisia Artful, announces that she is to lead a new party, the Arty Party, on a Gross National Creativity ticket, with significant financial backing from wealthy individuals who have made name, fame and fortune from their creativity, and that they will be fielding candidates in every UK constituency.

Over the next six weeks the ArtyParty dominate the media. Artless research confirms that creativity has positive impact on national wellbeing, happiness, community health, and economic productivity, with a decrease in crime. Paradoxically, creativity correlates with reduced consumption, less competition, and more co-operation.

**April**. The Arty Party are elected with an overwhelming majority, and a mandate to implement unprecedented changes in how creativity is embedded in the national way

May. The Royal Academy announce that the Summer Exhibition selection is to be by lottery, with exhibits displayed reduced to one hundred due to budget constraints. Following an outcry Buckingham Palace is offered as a venue for all entrants, with no selection. Tens of thousands of entries are received. The new arrangement is a huge success, attracting vast number of foreign visitors, eager to see inside the Palace.

**June.** The Government, in association with Covent Garden, Sadlers Wells, ENO, Opera North, Scottish Opera, and Glyndebourne. introduces "Opera for All, Everywhere You Go". Transport workers on trains and buses, trained in bel canto, sing all public announcements, interspersed with operatic

Wimbledon, in recognition of its full title "All England Lawn Tennis and Croquet Club". announces two new tournaments, tennis-ballet, and dance-croquet, in association with the Royal Ballet and Sadlers Wells. July. Opera for All proves so successful that

it is extended to hospitals and prisons, with dramatic improvements in recovery time and morale. Tennis-ballet has proved so popular that the MCC introduces cricket-ballet to complement the Test Series.

August. The BBC declares the Albert Hall roof unsafe. Rather than cancel the Proms, they continue in True Brit-Grit, stiff upper-lip style, umbrellas at the ready, and a canopy over the stage. Advance bookings confirm this was the right decision. Management instal a swimming pool in the promenade area. Initial tests confirm a transformational impact on sound quality.

September. The FA introduce

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The Arty Party Secretary of State for Education confirms that curricula in schools and universities are being reviewed to ensure Arts and Humanities are given a higher


October. The Health Secretary confirms that GPs, prescribing creative and outdoor pursuits to complement medication and surgery for many conditions, report positive results across the board. Hospitals and surgeries create Physic Gardens growing medicinal and culinary plants.

**November.** The Minister for Food Security and Rural Affairs, in a joint announcement with the Royal College of Music, announce that performing live music improves the quality and disease resistance of plants and animals. Farmers and growers are offered subsidies to engage musicians.

**December**. The Patent Office announce large increases in new inventions, ascribed to increased creativity in the workplace. These are attracting global interest. The UK's intellectual capital has increased ten-

fold in six months. Inward investment into the UK has reached unprecedented levels, enabling the national debt to be written off.

The old order changeth in the far South West

Mary Gladstone traces the artistic connections behind some current property movements in darkest Wigtownshire

IT HAPPENS to the best and, in some cases, the worst of us. Our housing situation changes and we down-size. Not only Mr. Mountbatten Windsor is calling in the removals, but also a couple of families in the Wigtown District of Dumfries & Galloway, whose large properties have belonged to them for generations.

Selling-up isn't unusual. The posh have been doing it for decades, their piles consigned to rubble or turned into, you name it: hotels, schools, hospitals or even prisons and their grounds made into reserves for exotic animals or theme parks. In affluent times, these people often patronised the arts and these two Wigtownshire families, now flogging their houses, were no exception.

Monreith House, a listed Georgian mansion situated near Port William on the Machars peninsula, is up for grabs for £1,890,000. With the house, come 328 acres, several cottages and a private church. Monreith land has been in the Maxwells' hands since the 17th century (possibly longer).

One scion was the naturalist Gavin Maxwell, best-selling author of Ring of Bright Water in which he tells the story of his pet otter that lived with him near Glenelg in north-west Scotland. Gavin's grandfather, Herbert, was a novelist, essayist, artist, antiquarian, horticulturist and salmon angler, who catalogued his plants as they flowered by painting them daily until he died aged 92.

Ironically, it's another artist's paintings of Wigtownshire flowers that have stood the test of time, while Herbert's are largely forgotten. Close to Monreith is the House of Elrig, built in 1912 by Herbert's son and daughter-in-law, where they and their children lived. By the beginning of World War II, the Maxwells had sold the house to the Czech professor, Emil Korner. It was to Elrig that fellow emigré, artist Oskar Kokoschka (1886 –1980) and his Czech wife, Olda, came each summer for several weeks between 1941 and 1946. Deemed a 'degenerate' by the Nazis, Oskar Kokoschka fled Austria in 1934 for Prague, obtaining Czech citizenship the following year. In 1938, he moved to the UK and remained here during the War.

Kokoschka was one of the greatest figurative painters of the 20th century and his summers at Elrig, offering him respite from wartime London, enabled him to be more gentle and

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lyrical in his style than before.

He painted few oils during this period, concentrating instead on water colours and sketches in coloured pencil. Wild flowers, animals, landscapes, seafood, game, intimate portraits and scenes from daily life became his principal subjects. Kokoschka filled his sketchbooks with drawings that captured in a few strokes, the essentials of a scene.

During August and September 1945, Kokoschka's series of water colours featuring Doris, a relative of the Korners, with a cat on her lap, demonstrates his shift towards a softer, more affectionate representation.

When we consider his signature painting on long-

term loan to the Scottish National Gallery in Edinburgh, of his 'Self-portrait of a Degenerate Artist', painted in response to his inclusion in the Nazis' 'Degenerate Art Exhibition' in 1937, with its defiant pose and violent brushwork, it's clear that Kokoschka's Elrig visits helped to bring out in him a warm, emotional approach to his Expressionism. As for Doris and the cat, the artist used these sketches ('Girl with Cat') for his last oil painting (1973-76).

Also up for sale is Dunskey Castle, a 12th century tower-house, a ruin since 1700. Perched on a clifftop overlooking the Irish Sea, it retains parts of its cellar, watch-tower and north wing. It's going for £ 100,000. Over the past three centuries various edifices on a site farther inland have become the family's residence. Today, Dunskey House, an Edwardian manor, is a posh venue for parties and weddings.

Towards the late 19th century, David Hunter Blair owned Dunskey estate. While at Oxford University in 1874, he befriended Oscar Wilde and was called 'Dunsky' by his undergraduate pals. Whether Wilde ever visited the estate is open to question but the two men remained friends after they left Oxford. "I have a vivid recollection of him at our first meeting." wrote Hunter Blair. "The large features lit up by

intelligent, sparkling eves, and a broad cheerful smile: an attractive personality, enhanced by his extraordinary conversa-

tional abilities." Both were known for their wit, aesthetic

interests and spiritual enquiry. Hunter Blair converted to Catholicism. While his Oxford friends ignored his decision, Wilde was curious about it. Hunter Blair saw that Wilde was interested and tried to help him to convert by inviting him to Rome and arranging an audience for him with

For the Catholic convert, their visit was unsuccessful, particularly when he saw how his friend was moved by the sight of Keats's grave in the Protestant cemetery. Wilde lay prostrate before the grave, far more overcome with emotion than he had been in his audience with the stiff Pope Pius IX.

Hunter Blair became a Benedictine monk and eventually an abbot. Ten years after Wilde matriculated at Oxford, Wilde called on his old friend in Edinburgh. On leaving him, he sank to his knees and said: "Pray for me, Dunskie, pray for me."

Perhaps he knew what was in store for him.. At the end of his life, while in exile in Paris, Wilde converted to Catholicism. Hunter Blair never stopped praying for his old friend's

Who knows if the new owners of these Wigtown District properties will follow their

predecessors in championing the arts. For an obscure, often forgotten region, it's good to know that the two Osc(k)ars found in it a



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### The world of wood faggotters, yowlers and biscuit-oddmen...

Nick Jones has been meeting some of the practitioners in James Fox's masterly account

YES, this Journey Through Britain's Lost Arts and Vanishing Trades by James Fox is primarily about the importance of making by and with human hands, blessed with opposing thumbs, enabling us to manipulate and grip. But also the triumph of the human spirit - obsessive, determined, perfectionist, bloody-minded.

James is Creative Director of the Hugo Burge Foundation at Marchmont, near Duns, where the foundation provides studios for artists, makers and artisans. His passion for and commitment to supporting and encouraging the crafts is clear. He describes in fascinating detail how surnames confirm that our forebears were makers - Smith, Wright, Taylor, Mason - it's a long list. Funny, sometimes ribald too: biscuit-oddman, bumboat man, butt woman, wood

Our language is equally revealing. Ringing clear as a bell through this remarkable journey are characters who don't give a damn about time, or money, or creature comforts. Their aim? To learn, practiise and perfect their trade; to make artefacts which are useful, durable, and beautiful; and to enjoy making them. Critical to many are local materials.

This connection with place makes economic, ecological and emotional sense, especially if materials are abundant and free. James travelled from remote Highlands to Isles of Scilly to find these people. Many have no interest in being seen, known or, Heaven Forfend, adulated. They just want to get on with their demanding, painstaking, time-consuming, highly skilled work. Mistakes and setbacks are par for the course. There are no shortcuts

The book divides into three sections. The first, Landscape, covers dry-stone walling in Yorkshire, thatching in Wester Ross, chair-bodging in the Chilterns, and rush-weaving in Bedfordshire.

In the second, Community, James tracks down the last major oak bark tannery in Britain, and, over the river, a master wheelwright, both in Colyton, Devon. Next comes basket making for fishermen in Devon, Cornwall, and the Isles of Scilly. Then he's off to Loughborough, home to Taylors, Britain's only extant bell foundry, to meet their Gujarati tuner, one of few worldwide with the skill and patience for this exacting calling. Then to Cambridge, to the Cardozo

Kindersley letter-carving studios, creating plaques, memorials, signs and headstones. Apprenticeship demands a complete change of attitude to time, being in the moment and never, ever, hurrying a job.


In the final section, Industry, he describes how Roger Smith, aged sixteen, determined to be a bespoke watchmaker. He spent eighteen months making a watch to show the great horologist George Daniels, who told him to start again. He did. Now, a Roger T Smith watch costs a seven figure sum, and you may have to wait years. To County Antrim next, home of Bushmills whiskey, and the gentle art of coopering, aka cask-making. Golden rule one: never drink the hard stuff! Then to Sheffield to find out about tool-making, and the putter-togethering of scissors. Cutting paper will never be the same!

In the final chapter, "The Crucible", James is in London, giving the lie to any notion that crafts are restricted to some hazy, bucolic rural idyll. Here he finds multicultural international buzzing hives of activity where sofers, scribes of sacred Hebrew texts, produce mezuzahs; where griots. West African troubadours, make ngonis and balafons; and where Japanese potters throw porcelain meipings, plum blossom vases.

Not long ago these traditional trades would have been written off as relics of a bygone age, irrelevant, albeit sometimes quaint, amusing, or instructive. The kind of thing you might see in a museum, junk shop or down the dump.

Each generation has its deities. Today Great AI appears to hold sway, with mysterious binary acolytes like ChatGPT. You know, Generative Pre-trained Transformer, a chatbot, openAI that can walk, talk and make... kind of. Except..

Except that the human spirit, ever resilient, obstinate, crafty even. is making a comeback. Far from being ancient history, Craftland is a clarion call, inviting us to wake up, listen, and take note, and make. The past is the future. The crafts are an important



part of the creative economy, growing faster than the automative, aerospace, life science and fossil fuel industries combined. Better still, they can change the cycle of consumption and waste.

Most important, as James concludes "They express something too many of us have forgotten: making satisfies a deep and essential need, and so helps us feel truly human." 具数数

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### Harvest time at Edinburgh's City Art Centre

Tessa Williams ta;ls to Dr Stacey Hunter, curator of the recent Craft **Scotland Contemporary Craft Fair** 

SCOTLAND'S CRAFT world got a big boost this autumn with the inauguration of HARVEST – A feast for the senses, a sparkling craft design show on the fourth floor of the City Arts Centre in Edinburgh, attracting more than 8000 visitors and showing the work of eighty independent Scottish craft makers, the event garnered much local interest as well as internationally from craft buvers.

Curated by former jewellery designer and Duncan of Jordanstone graduate, the irrepressible Dr Stacey Hunter, it brought a new level of interest to many crafts and styles that are resolutely Scottish in heritage.

Chatting with Stacey just as she wrapped up the show in Edinburgh, it was fascinating to hear how she managed to put it all together in such a short

"I had a conversation with Irene Kernan (the head of Craft Scotland) in February, and we took it from there.

"I always felt there was the need for a new platform or a way for independent curators to show their work. Ever since 2020 this notion of conviviality had been playing over in my mind, I had wanted to do a big show with that at the centre of it – and

the craft world epitomises this.

"The way it crosses over with our human desire to break bread with one another. How that also - also the idea for us as buyers of craft, how does one decide what objects to place on the table when you invite people over to dine with you? You take a lot of care what you dress the table with. I wanted to really lean in to that and show what people wanted to show for their own homes.

she explained.

Having studied at Duncan of Jordanstone, in Dundee, followed later by a PhD at the University of Edinburgh's School of Architecture, where she focused on design culture, urbanism, and the built environment, Stacey has travelled extensively in her career.

"After I graduated I lived in Hamburg for a while, doing some research - when I was finishing my degree I had won a travel prize to research at a German electronic company - I was interested in lighting design in my final year - quite quickly after that I got a job at the Lighthouse in Glasgow which was where my interest in public programming began" she explained.

Her work has also taken her to Japan,

"I was selected as a curator for the Tokyo Olympics as some curators from Japan came over to Scotland and offered to help to do an open call here in Scotland. It was marvellous, I had two whole months there, one month in Tokyo and one in a very small porcelain making town. It was a brilliant experience to have there!" she enthused.

Stacey has also enjpyed success on earlier curating projects in Scotland - Local Heroes which showed design work at Edinburgh airport and in the Merchant City, as well as collaborating with New York Jewellery week on a digital exhibition showcasing more Scottish designers.

Harvest took over one floor - the fourth floor - of



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"It's my favourite floor of the City Arts Centre with its 250 square metres of space, and beautiful arched windows, it's the perfect size.

"The City Art Centre as a building, was really the starting point for the concept of Harvest. This building has always inspired me. Since it began life as the Scotsman building. A newspaper building to begin with and then later, when the Waverley station was established and the fruit market was taken from what's currently Waverley and moved to Market Street - the

building became a fruit and vegetable warehouse Then in 1980 the city architects converted it into custom built exhibition gallery space.

"I was thinking of how it is like a trading post, first of newspapers and ideas, then food and then a market, it really inspired me, also I loved the Idea of the harvest time, it is a unique time for Scottish creators and harvesters," she added.

"We issued an open call, we didn't charge anyone to apply – the open call went out and we were overwhelmed by the response. In fact we had to call in help from others to whittle it down," Stacey added.

"Who knows yet whether it could in future be a yearly event. It would lend itself well. What we have created

is a really valuable brand. I don't know any specifics, but certainly there will be another Harvest," she concluded.

### A festival with a difference

THE LIGHTS DIMMED slowly in St Andrew's Church and the audience grew quiet, waiting for the first notes to sound. The ancient stone, watched over by medieval effigies, drew in the candlelight as a violin line rose from the back of the nave. A simple beginning, yet it marked the arrival of something quietly remarkable in the Sussex village of Fletching: the first Fletching Arts Festival.

The festival founder is Charlotte Scott, a regular guest leader of the Scottish Chamber Orchestra, together with vocalist Isabelle Peters. They first discussed the idea in May and, in a matter of months, brought to life a three evening celebration of chamber music and poetry. "It was a huge community effort," Charlotte says. "We had very little time, but we felt there was a call for culture here. We knew people would support it."

Support arrived with enthusiasm. Between forty and fifty volunteers from the village stepped forward, offering help with everything from baking and stewarding to transforming the church into a performance space. Over three evenings the pews filled and the atmosphere had the warmth and generosity of an event that felt rooted in village life from an earlier era.

The programme encompassed works that stretched from the tenth century chant Piritus Sanctus to pieces by Britten and readings from Oscar Wilde. They were performed by world class musicians, in-cluding players from the Doric and Navarra Quartets, as well as actors and broadcasters with international reach such as James Wilby and the BBC's Katy Derham.

Much of the festival's character lay in its approach to performance. In conceiving the programme, Charlotte and Isabelle wanted to rethink the traditional classical concert and offer something, in Charlotte's words, "intimate, personal and immersive, to truly

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elevate the experience of chamber music".

The repertoire itself may be familiar and played internationally, but in Fletching they sought to create a different kind of encounter, with music, poetry and prose flowing into one another in a single continuous arc. Performers moved around the building, appearing in different parts of the church so that the audience felt drawn into the performance rather than kept at a distance.

One moment in particular captured the ambition of the festival. During the opening concert Isabelle appeared at the back of the church beneath a candle lit pillar and sang Purcell's Evening Hymn, accompanied by Jens Frank on theorbo. Her voice, the glow of the candles and the closeness of the audience created a moment that seemed to hold time still.

Why is a Sussex village festival finding a place in this Scottish arts paper? Partly because Charlotte has long standing connections with the Scottish Chamber Orchestra. But Fletching itself carries a sur-prisingly strong Scottish thread. The dedication to St Andrew is only the beginning. The Burns Night supper in the village hall is one of the most anticipated dates in the local calendar and the village boasts three Scottish pipers who vie to lead local processions.

Charlotte and Isabelle hope to present three or four evenings next year, continuing to intertwine words and music and to take creative risks. Their aim is to let the festival grow naturally while keeping its sense of closeness and discovery. It may be early days but with world class musicians, an eager community and an atmosphere entirely its own,

Glyndebourne may have a new neighbour to watch just half an hour up the road.

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
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
